

# Floor 5




Floor 5, Gallery 501

What do you see, hear, and smell?




Floor 5, Gallery 506

He named these sculptures *Fish* and *Bird in Space*. Can you tell which one is which?


<u>Draw</u> an animal using simple shapes. What will you include?
