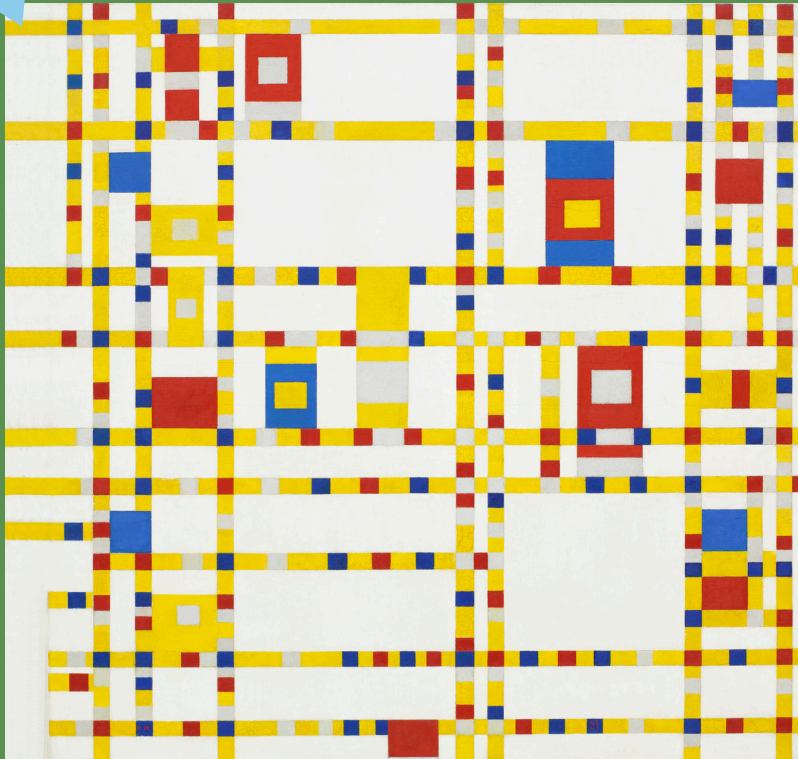


Kids Activity Card

Find *Broadway Boogie Woogie*, by Piet Mondrian, on the fifth floor of the Museum.

Look closely at the painting. What does it make you think of? Share your ideas with your friends and family.

Mondrian named this painting after Broadway, a long street that runs through New York City. The other part of the title, *Boogie Woogie*, is a type of jazz music that he loved. In the painting, Mondrian arranged the blocks of color to show the rhythm of boogie-woogie music.

Assign a sound or city noise to each color. For example, “beep-beep” could stand for yellow. Then, pick a line in *Broadway Boogie Woogie* and play it.
