


Have you ever wanted to travel through time?




Materials All Around

Floor 2

Installations are artworks that transform whole spaces. You can sometimes walk through, around, or under them.

Your mission is to explore the installations, search for surprising materials, and notice how you feel being inside or surrounded by an artwork.

<u>Find</u> House of Hope by Montien Boonma in Gallery 211 (opens Dec 23).

What materials do you notice?

The installation is made up of 1,648 strands of beads made from herbs and 440 red stools painted with spices like turmeric and cinnabar.

Boonma was inspired by Buddhist temples and used scents that are meant to be healing.

He named this artwork *House of Hope* and imagined the beads as "black rain" spreading hope. Floor 2

<u>Find</u> Espiral para sueños compartidos (Spiral for Shared Dreams) by Carolina Caycedo in the Marron Family Atrium.

<u>Look up</u> at the nets and fish traps. What do they make you think of?

<u>Sketch</u> their shapes, lines, and shadows.

Through her art, Caycedo calls attention to issues she cares about. A problem she wants to spotlight with this installation is how climate change and dams (which block the natural flow of water) affect fishing for communities who live along rivers.

These nets were made by four groups of fishing collaboratives in different parts of Mexico. The artist colored and embroidered them.

Caycedo named this artwork *Spiral for Shared Dreams*. How does the title express her ideas?


