Things to do



In our interactive **Art Lab** space, kids and adults experiment, play, create, and make connections between their own creative explorations and the ideas, tools, and techniques behind modern and contemporary art.

Open daily, 10:30 a.m.–4:30 p.m.
Open late on Fridays until 6:30 p.m.

Located on the first floor of The Lewis B. and Dorothy Cullman Education and Research Building.



Use **Activity Cards** to take a closer look at works of art. Available in the Art Lab and at information desks throughout the Museum.



Listen to **MoMA Audio: Kids**, a free audio program for ages five to 12. Available at the audio program desks on the first and sixth floors in English, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Mandarin, Portuguese, and Spanish.



Participate in weekend **Family Programs at MoMA**. Visit moma.org/family for information about gallery conversations, art workshops, and film screenings for families with kids ages four to 14.

Explore the architecture of the Museum building.

What do you see from the windows? How many bridges do you cross?

Choose a topic or theme for your visit, such as people, places, or objects.

Ask your kids to describe what they notice while looking at works of art. Share what you notice, too!

Play “I Spy” to identify shapes, colors, and objects in works of art.

Use your imagination!

Ask your kids what they would see, smell, or hear if they were inside a work of art.

Write a story or make up a conversation between characters you find in a work of art.

View artworks from different distances. Do they look different up close than they do from far away?

Sketch works of art.

Look at the wall label and read the title of the artwork. Ask your kids if they think the title matches the work. What would they name it? Why?

Be creative! Invent your own game.

Ideas for looking at art with kids

Tips

Explain to your kids why they can't touch the art.

The natural oils on our hands can cause damage.

Drawing is a great way to look closely.

Pencils can be used in the galleries and are available at information desks.

Take breaks. Depending on your child's age, aim for 30 to 90 minutes in the galleries.

Grab a bite. A kids' menu and high chairs are available in Cafe 2. The Sculpture Garden café offers snacks and is open seasonally.

Restrooms. Baby-changing stations are available in all restrooms. There is a family restroom on the fifth floor and on level T1 (outside Theater 1).

Power up. Charging stations for electronic devices can be found on the second floor, near Cafe 2.
