

Dear Sir:

I am writing you with the hope of obtaining your attention. I have been informed recently by Mr. McKinney that the Baltimore Museum will show an exhibit of abstract paintings in the very near future. I also understand that this exhibition has been arranged and is sponsored by yourself. If these exhibition includes the pioneer abstractionists of America, then the following information should interest you.

I have been painting for nearly forty years, and when American artists first began to experiment in abstract painting, and to exhibit their work in New York, I had the privilege of showing my work along with theirs. These early exhibitions were held at the N. E. Montross galleries, and I was invited to participate by the late Mr. N. E. Montross. I still have some of the Montross letters on file, as well as, N. Y. Press clippings and catalog of exhibits.

These abstracts of mine fall in the class that are generally known as pure abstracts. Some of them might seem to be rather complex intuitive compositions, but they are based upon a simple geometric base; others are quite simple in their structure, altho, all are related more or less to dynamic symmetry. The object being, to compose with lines, forms, and colors in very much the way that the old masters used figures and related objects to achieve their abstract qualities. During the past twenty years, due to financial necessities, I was forced away from the pure abstracts to the more or less semi-abstracts. But of late I have felt the need to swing back to the pure abstracts again.

Ten years ago, Mr Duncan Phillips started to purchase some of my work and he now has about six of my paintings. I am also represented in the Cone Collection and the Blanche Adler Collection of Baltimore. This past spring I showed thirty abstracts at a local gallery, and they received very favorable comment from A. D. Emmart, critic for the Baltimore Sun, and from Mr. Hugh Breckenridge of Philadelphia. Twenty years ago, amd entirely original.

All of the foregoing leads up to the question: Whether it would be possible for you to consider having me represented in the forthcoming exhibition of abstracts at the Baltimore Museum? If this is to be a retrospective exhibition of American abstract paintings, in my opinion, it would not be complete without at least one of my abstracts. Mr. McKinney is a very good friend of mine, and I feel sure that he could select a representative canvas for you, if you should so desire.

In view of the fact that I have fought and struggled for the recognition of modern art since its inception, not only through practise but through teaching and otherwise, you would reward me greatly by granting me this request.

I have just returned from Chicago where I saw the exhibit of Abstract Art by Gabo, Pevsner, Mondrian, and Domela at the Arts Club of Chicago. I am wild about it--not only in general, but in particular--for reasons that have to do with the Design Laboratory. Just the sort of thing that the Design students should have the opportunity to see--something that stands half-way between what is generally known as Applied Art and Fine Art.
