

Box #1 - PAINTINGS

- Lift out cardboard cases containing paintings with extreme care, one by one.
- 2. Pull out pictures from cardboard cases carefully. All are glazed.
- 3. Replace all cardboard cases in packing box and put back cover.

BOXES #2 and #3 - SCULPTURE

- 1. Remove loose excelsior and lift out, one by one, wooden inner boxes containing sculpture.
- Open inner boxes and lift out sculpture with the utmost care. Several pieces of sculpture are of plaster and therefore very fragile.
- 3. Replace flannel and excelsior in each inner box from which it has been removed and put inner boxes and excelsior back in the packing cases.

The sculpture can be repacked correctly only if the same packing material is used.

1. Place each picture in the cardboard case which bears a corresponding number. The pictures will fit correctly only in the proper cardboard cases.

Be sure the frame of the picture does not protrude above side of cardboard case.

- 2. Place cardboard cases containing pictures in packing box.
 - 3. Place cover on box and screw in tightly. Be sure iron washers are on screws before attaching screw heads.

PACKING INSTRUCTIONS FOR BOXES #2 and #3 - SCULPTURE

- 1. Fill inner boxes with loose excelsior.
- 2. Wrap each piece of sculpture in flannel and place in inner box bearing the corresponding number. Fasten cover of inner box.
- 3. Fill in bottom of large packing case with loose excelsior for at least six inches.

The work of children has for many years been admired by modern artists and by those interested in modern art. The unconventionality, the directness of technique and the imaginative freedom which many children show in their work has often been the envy of grown-up artists. The paintings included in this exhibition show a remarkably varied range of subjects, some of which are: Robinson Crusoe as a Young Man, The Goldfish Bowl, Politics Under The "El", Ship's Boiler Room, City Houses, The Laundry, Playing Marbles. The sculpture, in terra cotta, plaster, wood and bronze, demonstrates the children's familiarity with many materials. Some of the pieces included are: Sextette from Lucia, Cat, Unemployed Man, Bareback Rider, Spanish Refugee.

The work of children in the art classes under the Federal Art Project has attracted a considerable amount of attention. Hundreds of highly trained teachers of art, displaced by depression economy, are holding classes daily in boys' clubs, in schools after hours, in churches, settlement houses, children's homes, orphan asylums, Y.M.C.A. branches and community centers. Mr. Holger Cahill, Director of the Federal Art Project, writes: "The children are taught through practice rather than by verbal instruction, each child being given training in the craft of the art and then allowed to develop his own personal expression. Intensity of feeling has

produced instinctive simplifications in their painting and sculpture. A large proportion of these youngsters are realists, describing their impressions of speeding locomotives, of steamboats, and of El trains undaunted by detail or compositional complexity. In sculpture they have shown themselves unafraid of their materials. They do not seek beautiful surfaces or prettiness of detail but let their sense of the round and the flat, the crest and the hollow, pass directly into the material."
