The exhibition, selected by the well known art critic Miss Dore Ashton, in consultation with Mr. William Seitz, Associate Gurator of Painting and Sculpture Exhibitions at our Museum, opened at the Museo de Bellas Artes in Caracas on January 14, 1962. We plan to invite approximately 10 museums in leading Latin American cities to collaborate with us in showing the exhibition and hope very much that Santiago can be included on this itinerary. Although we cannot yet propose completely accurate dates, the preliminary itinerary indicates that the period September 7 through October 4, 1962 might be most advantageous. If this period would not fit into your schedule, I would appreciate it if you would suggest alternate dates when you might be able to accommodate the exhibition.

In order to afford you a comprehensive idea of the scope of the exhibition, I have enclosed a copy of the Museo de Bellas Artes' recently published catalog of the exhibition. The Museo has offered to make the catalog available to other Latin American exhibitors at a nominal cost and, in the event you are able to show the exhibition, the design could be adapted quite easily for your showing. Your letter of May 25 addressed to the Cultural Affairs Officer of the United States Embassy in Santiago has been forwarded to this Museum by Mr. Hichael V. Karnis along with his own letter further confirming the Santiago showing of our ABSTRACT DRAWINGS AND WATERCOLORS: USA exhibition.

We were gratified to learn that the Museo de Arte Contemporaneo would be able to accommodate the exhibition and I am writing to confirm the various details regarding the exhibition's shipment, dates of showing, cost and catalogue.

1. Shipment: The exhibition is currently at the Museo de Arte Moderno in Ruenos Aires where it will be on view through July 22. Demediately following the Buenos Aires showing, the exhibition will be transported to Montevideo, Uruguay where it will be shown from August 1 to August 17 under the suspices of the National Commission of Fine Arts. Since your showing of the axhibition will now follow Hontevideo, rather than Buenos Aires as we had originally planned, I hope you will be able to proceed with your transportation arrangements on that basis. I hope this change in the exhibition's itinerary will not adversely affect your plans to request free transportation from either Pansgre or IAN. Could I request that you coordinate the shipping arrangements with Mr. Karnis, since we feel it would be advisable to have the shipment from Montevideo consigned directly to our Embassy in Santiago in order to avoid customs delays. Barring any unforseen delays in Montevideo, I should think the shipment's transport could be arranged for sometime during the week of August 20. I will, at any rate, send a copy of this letter to Mr. Marnis along with the request that he contact the U. S. Embassy in Montevideo to determine exactly when shipment of the exhibition could be made and that he then discuss this matter with you.

I have enclosed two copies of the exhibition's box list for your information and for use in unpacking the shipment.

2. Dates of showing: Assuming that it will be possible to transport the exhibition to Santiago from Montevideo during the week of August 20, it appears that you could plan to open the show during the first week

I have enclosed a copy of this catalog for your information and would suggest, if you are interested in using it for your showing of the exhibition, that you write directly to Mr. Niguel Arroyo C., Director of the Museo de Bellas Artes, to secure additional copies. Also enclosed are copies of the exhibition's check list in English and the artists' biographies, also in English.

For your use in publicizing the exhibition, I am further enclosing a copy of our suggested press release on the show as well as 15 black-and-white glossy photographs. Would you be so kind as to return the photographs when you have finished with them? I am sure that Mr. Kernis will be interested in cooperating with you in planning your publicity program and I hope you will discuss this matter with him also.

In addition to this material, I am enclosing our Arrival Notice, Condition Report, Shipping Record and Publicity Report forms with the request that they be completed and returned to me at the times indicated on each form.

I would like to take this early opportunity to wish you a most successful Santiago showing of the exhibition. I shall look forward to hearing from you soon.



I wish to acknowledge receipt of your cable and your letter dated July 10, which informed us of the slight change in schedule of the exhibit ABSTRACT DRAWINGS AND WATER COLORS: USA. I have consulted with Mr. Caballero concerning the change in showing dates and also with the directors of the Chilean Association of Artists and Sculptors.

In all probability, we will be unable to inaugurate the exhibit in Santiago until Friday, September 14. Dear Mr. Karnis:

As you know from my cable of yesterday morning, the itinerary of the ABSTRACT DRAWINGS AND WATERCOLORS: USA exhibition has been changed slightly in order to include a brief showing in Montevideo. I have enclosed a copy of my letter of yesterday's date to Mr. Jorge Caballero Cristi which informs him of this change officially and which gives him the various details of the exhibition's future shipment from Montevideo to Santiago and other related information.

I hope that you will be able to coordinate the details of the shipment from Montevideo and would suggest that you contact Mr. Francis A. Cooke, the CAO at the U.S. Embassy in Montevideo, as soon as possible to determine exactly when the shipment could be forwarded. By the time this reaches you, hopefully, Mr. Cooke will have had an opportunity to discuss the shipment's transit from Buenos Aires with the CAO there and should have a good idea of whether it will be possible to open the Montevideo showing on August 1 as planned. Assuming that the exhibition opens in Montevideo on schedule and that it closes on August 17, it should be relatively easy to have it repacked and ready for shipment to you during the week of August 20. Providing that it would have no effect on Mr. Caballero's plans to request free transportstion from either Panagra or IAN, we would hope that the shipment from Montevideo could be consigned directly to the U.S. Pabassy in Santiago rather than to the Museo de Arte Contemporaneo in order to avoid customs delays. Thank you for your detailed letter of March 19 informing us that The Board of Directors of the Institute of Plastic Arts has expressed an interest in showing our ARSTRACT DRAWINGS AND WATER-COLORS: USA exhibition at the Museo de Arte Contemporaneo in Santiago. We were delighted with the news and this letter will confirm your tentative arrangements.

I would appreciate knowing, at your earliest convenience, whether our subsequent correspondence regarding the details of the exhibition and its Santiago showing should be directed to the Director of the Museo or to your office? If you would prefer to handle these details yourself, it would be perfectly agreeable to us; however, I would like to have some sort of written confirmation from the Museo for our own records.

Since my earlier letters to Sr. Bonta Costa and yourself, we have confirmed showings of the exhibition at the Museu de Arte Moderna in Rio de Janeiro from March 29 - April 28 and in São Paulo at the Museu de Arte Moderna from May 8 - May 31. The next showing has been offered to Montevideo but has not yet been confirmed; following Montevideo, we have confirmed a booking at the Museo de Arte Moderno in Buenos Aires and this would be followed by the Santiago showing. Until we hear from the Escuela Mactonal in Montevideo, I can not definitely confirm that the exhibition will be available for Santiago on the dates mentioned in my earlier correspondence. The itinerary now appears to be running approximately two weeks behind schedule and, barring any future delays, this would mean that it could probably open in Santiago on September 21 rather than September 7. However, I hope the Museo de Arte Contemporaneo's schedule is flexible enough to accompodate the exhibition even though it is delayed a bit and I can assure you that I will write as soon as I am in a position to offer absolutely accurate dates.

With such an extraordinary number of delays, it is truly amazing that you were able to open the exhibition on schedule. Chr sonsorvator

We were also greatly pleased to learn that the Santiago showing of the exhibition had been such a success and that the Chilean public had responded so enthusiastically to the works. From the photographs you forwarded, the Reifschneider Gallery looked like a most appropriate space for the show and I thought your installation of it was also quite handsome.

I regret that the Chilean sponsors of the show did not take a more active part in coordinating the details of the Reifschneider showing and in assuming a greater part of the financial responsibility involved. As you know from our earlier letters, we had hoped that the various institutions which exhibited the show would assume most of the work and cost themselves and that the United States Embassies in the various countries would act simply as our liason agents in handling the details of shipment and in coordinating publicity. I think this premise is actually feasible when the exhibiting institution is an established museum, as was the case in Caracas, Rio de Janeiro and Sao Paulo, where the showings were arranged almost solely by the museums themselves and where our Embassies were involved to a much more minimal extent.

In those cities on the exhibition's itinerary in which museum facilities have either been unavailable, or for some other reason not completely appropriate for the show, most of the organizational work has been accomplished by our Embassies. I do hope we will be able to work out a more satisfactory arrangement, from the Embassy's point of view, the next time we plan to send one of our shows to Santiago.

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You will be interested in knowing that we did request official U.S.I.A. sponsorship for the drawings and watercolors exhibition, first in August 1961 and again in January 1962. We did not, however, check carefully to ascertain the maximum case dimensions which the Latin American Airlines could accomodate; part of the reason for this was that we expected most of the transits to be either overland or by ocean freight, since we knew in advance that most Latin American institutions do not have large funds at their disposal for temporary exhibitions. This factor will definitely be considered in the future, as will your suggestion regarding the possibility of securing advance transportation pledges from the sirlines servicing cities included on our future itineraries. To date, however, we have never succeeded in obtaining free transportation from any of the airlines.

We were concerned about the news contained in your condition report regarding the wrinkled condition which several of the drawings have developed and have already made arrangements to have one of them flown back to New York immediately after the Lima showing. Our conservator will then be able to check it thoroughly and let us know whether we must withdraw any of the other works. I hope this step does not prove necessary. The Museum of Modern Art's circulating exhibition
"Abstract Drawings and Water Colors: USA" opened on
schedule in Santiago on Monday, September 24. We plan
it will terminate on schedule on Saturday October 6,
although there is a good possibility that the presentation
will be extended through Wednesday, October 10 by popular
demand. I am enclosing the forms which the Museum had
forwarded to Mr. Jorge Caballero, Director of the University
of Chile's Institute for Extension of the Plastic Arts,
the local group which in collaboration with the Chilean
Association of Painters and Sculptors is sponsoring the
Santiago showing.

We have been in contact with the Embassy in Lima and feel that it will be possible for us to forward the exhibit by air during the week of October 15-19. The most important thing to report is that so far the exhibit has met with unprecedented success here in Santiago. The exhibit was opened to the public on Monday at 7 p.m. By Wednesday midday our entire print run of 1,000 catalogues had been exhausted! The reaction of the critics and the Santiago public in general has been unanimously favorable. Upon termination of the exhibit we shall forward a complete set of newspaper clippings, set of posters which were produced to publicize the exhibit, and a copy of the invitations which were sent out. Under separate cover

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forwarded three copies of our locally-produced catalogue which was very similar to the one produced in Caracas, Venezuela.

Without wishing to make this letter too extensive, we would like to comment upon some of the rather unusual difficulties we encountered before being able to inaugurate the Santiago showing. Following receipt of your cable advising us of PANAGRA's willingness to supply free transportation from Buenos Aires to Santiago, we made the necessary arrangements with the Santiago office agreeing that the Embassy would pay the air freight cost from Montevideo to Buenos Aires. On or about the first of September we called the Embassy in Montevideo long-distance to determine how the showing stood there and were informed that it had formally closed but that several items were being used on local television shows and that the exhibition was not yet ready for shipment to Santiago. In any event, we were unable to program the inauguration here prior to Monday the 24th of September inasmuch as the 18 and 19th of September are the Chilean National Holidays and the week in which they fall is always a dead week.

During the week of September 10-14 the local PANAGRA office informed us that the New York office had cabled indicating that no free transportation could be provided until such time as the New York office received a written request from the Department of State in Washington.

After an exchange of cables between New York and Santiago, it was agreed that a formal written request from the American Ambassador to Chile would serve in lieu of a written request from the State Department.

After this hurdle was passed PANAGRA informed us that two of the four cases were too large to fit through the door of their jet plane and hence they would be unable to transport them unless permission were granted to repack the drawings and water colors in smaller cases. As this was obviously impossible, we therefore agreed to have the half of the exhibit that could not be flown by PANAGRA come from Buenos Aires Via LUFTHANSA. On Thursday, September 13th LUFTHANSA was unable to land in Montevideo due to bad weather nor could AIR FRANCE land the next day and consequently the exhibit was stuck in Uruguay until the following Thursday, September 20th. On this day LUFTHANSA delivered two of the four cases to PANAGRA in Buenos Aires carrying the other two directly to Santiago.

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Then it was discovered that the two cases unloaded at the Buenos Aires airport were precisely the two cases too large to fit the PANAGRA jet. At this point, the Buenos Aires airport was closed down two days because of the revolt of the Argentine Generals of the "Campo de Mayo". By the grace of God, LUFTHANSA was able to land at the Buenos Aires airport on Sunday, September 23rd, and the remaining half of the exhibit reached Santiago Customs that same day. The second half of the show reached the Reifschneider Gallery at about 5 P.M. on Monday the 24th, the day on which it was to open at seven P.M. with the American Ambassador to Chile officiating. If it had not been for the fact that the Museum's system of packing was so fantastically good, we never could have been able to open on time!! To add to the comedy and confusion, Santiago's leading daily newspaper, "El Mercurio", mistakenly reported that the exhibit would open at 5 P.M. so that just as the paintings arrived, the reporters from all the Santiago paper arrived on the scene along with an ex-Foreign Minister of Chile, Sr. German Vergara Donoso, a great art lover.

Well, as mentioned previously, the opening was a smash hit. The Reifschneider Gallery, an ultra-modern gallery perfectly suited for this type of show and located right in the heart of the city, (across the street from the Central Bank and only one block from the Presidential Palace), was full to overflowing. All of the leading art critics and intellectual leaders were in attendance. If we could pick one word to characterize the comments heard at the opening it would be "audacious".

In all fairness, it should be said that the burden of presenting the show to the Chilean public fell almost completely on the American Embassy. The Chilean sponsors were merely a front. All the work and expenses, with the exception of the posters and the printing of invitations, were borned by the Embassy. It is our understanding that this has been the case in many of the other countries. The Embassies in both Argentina and Peru are paying the transportation costs. Since it is very difficult to find organizations willing to accept responsibility here in Latin America and as it is almost impossible to present U.S. art shows without great difficulty at customs unless they are consigned to the American Embassy, it would seem practicable to consider the following in the future:

1.- Send the circulating exhibits to Latin America under official auspices. Thus it would not be necessary

for each individual post to make inquiry of the United States Information Agency in Washington as to how much support is authorized the exhibits sent abroad by the Museum of Modern Art. As it stands, the greater share of the expenditures incurred in the presentation of the circulating to Latin America exhibits are paid from official U.S. Government funds.

- 2.- Clear with U.S. airlines at their home offices so that they will provide free transportation for such circulating international exhibitions in Latin America. For the record, it would be necessary to have a written request from the Department of State, according to the local PANAGRA office.
- 3.- Take special caution to prepare the exhibits in cases which will fit through the doors of aircraft operated by the American Flag Carriers.

USIS Santiago is extremely grateful for having had the opportunity to work with this fine exhibit of contemporary American Art. We only wish that there were more funds available in Washington to permit a greater flow of such cultural material to the capitals of Latin America. We have noted with interest in the September 7th edition of "Time" magazine that the S.C. Johnson & Son collection "Art: USA: Now" is being sent abroad on tour with USIA as the overseas booking agent. We hope that more exhibits by Museums and private collections can travel abroad as it is our experience that the art lovers in Chile are hungry for exhibits of original works by American artists.

The "Abstract Drawings and Water Colors: USA" exhibit arrived in excellent condition taking into account the fact that it has gone through several changes of climate en route to Chile. The only damage noticed is described on the attached report. It appears that some of the drawings had become a bit wrinkly due to the humidity, a condition we feel is only

If the effect of this show elsewhere has been as remarkable as in Chile, we feel that this venture was a tremendous success!
