Dear Dr. Mahlow:

In Mr. McCray's absence on vacation and later extended leave from the Museum for travel, I am replying to your recent correspondence regarding the exhibitions of VISIONARY ARCHITECTURE and MARE ROTHEO. I am greatly concerned that several misunderstandings have occured regarding the two shows, and I hope that this letter can clarify our situation and result in the collaboration b etween our institutions which we all most sincerely desire.

1. MARE SOTHED Exhibition I regret very much that we cannot offer this exhibition to you since its itinerary will not permit us to schedule any showings in Germany. When Mr. McCray wrote you about the exhibition on April 10th, he had hoped that we would be able to offer it for one German showing; as he pointed out in his letter, we had not been able to predetermine the choice of the institution. Unfortungtely, it has not proven possible to bring the exhibition to Germany, and the report which you heard that the exhibition was to go to Rocklinghausen is comletely unfounded. Please he assured that had circumstances permitted we would have been sost pleased to offer the exhi-bition to your museum, and we know and appreciate your enthusiasm for Bothho's work.

VISIOHARY ANCHITECTURE

I have received your letter of July 11th to Mr. McCray and have noted that you plan to open the exhibition on September 23rd. Since we are now proceeding with the production of the revised smaller version of the exhibition, I want to bring you up-to-date on our plans and be certain that it conforms with your expectations.

Our designer is now working on the layout of the panels as described in Mr. McCray's letter of April 10th; between 70 and 75 photographic panels, each 36 inches square, with about 36 text panels, each 36 inches high by 12 inches wide. Although

this may sound like a rather inflexible scheme, I am sure
the final design will be most handsome and varied, since in
several cases a group of the panels will be combined to form
one large panel of an individual project, while in others
several photographs will be mounted on the same panel. The
text is being printed in English, and as soon as the designer
has coordinated the text to the photographic panels we would
send you a copy so that it could be translated into German for
your visitors for easy reference to the exhibition, or, if
your facilities permitted, you could produce text panels in
German according to the design of the English ones.

I do hope that this solution is satisfactory with you.

I realize that you had at one time hoped to produce a larger version of the exhibition, similar to the one presented in our Museum, but as I believe the United States Information Service in Bonn has informed you, our Museum did not feel it was possible to lend the negatives or to have smother version produced without direct supervision of the design. Unfortunately, our present commitments do not allow us to undertake this additional supervision.

Regarding the costs for the exhibition, your museum would be responsible for the costs of one-way transportation from New York and of course for any local costs incurred in your presentation. Since the exhibition has not yet been packed it is difficult to estimate the shipping expense; however, we are counting on approximately 9 or 10 cases with a total weight of about 2500 pounds. I am writing Mr. John J. Daly, the Assistant Cultural Affairs Officer for the United States Information Service in Bonn, in the event that U.S.I.S. way be able to assist with your presentation.

I would appreciate hearing from you at your earliest convenience confirming whether this arrangement is satisfactory with you. I should also be grateful for receiving more information on the catalog you intend to prepare. As you may know, our Museum is preparing an extensive publication on the subject and we would therefore prefer that if a catalog accompanies your showing of the exhibitioniit contain only a selection of the photographs reproduced in the show.

3. MODERN AMERICAN BRAWINGS

The exhibition which I mentioned to you during your visit to New York last summer has now begun its circulation, and I am forwarding to you separately a copy of the catalog prepared for its initial showing in Spoleto in connection with the Festival of Two Worlds. Enclosed herewith is a check list of the 73 drawings by 43 artists represented in the show. At present the exhibition is in Israel where it will be shown through the early autusn, and we are negotiating with other institutions regarding subsequent showings. Would it be possible

to fit the exhibition within your schedule sometime in the late spring of 1962? Again, it would be available for the costs of one-way transportation from the preceding city, and we would plan its itinerary so that the distance would not impose a great expense upon your transportation budget. The exhibition is packed in 3 cases with a total cubage of 232.4 cubic feet and total weight of 1,718 pounds. All drawings are framed and glazed with pleziglas for maximum security and ease in installation.

4. LEGRARD BASKIN EXHIBITION
Although we had not been in direct touch with you regarding this exhibition, we had discussed the possibility of German showings with the United States Information Service and had especially requested that you be contacted regarding a possible booking in Baden-Baden. We were informed that this was not possible during this summer, but in the event that you may wish to consider it later during its itinerary I am enclosing a catalog list of the exhibition. The 32 sculptures in bronze, wood and limestone and 7 bronze reliefs were selected by Peter Selz and 38 drawings and 12 woodcuts were chosen by William S. Lieberman. I have sent you separately a catalog of the exhibition which was prepared for its first showing at the Buseum Boymans-van Beumingen.

There is a possibility that the exhibition may be presented in Berlin this September at the time of the Arts Festival, and immediately afterwards it is scheduled in Paris during Bovember. We are contacting several museums regarding the three remaining bookings, which would be arranged on the following schedule:

December 15 - January 14, 1962 February 2 - March 4, 1962 March 23 - April 22, 1962

Would you let me know if you might be interested in one of these showings? In addition to the transportation costs from the preceding city, we are asking each exhibitor to reimburse the costs of insurance which is carried under our Museum's policy.

Finally to conclude this myrind of detail, Mr. Selm asked me to tell you that he received your letter of July 17th and regretted very much that he could not be of assistance with the Louise Nevelson exhibition, but immediately after the opening of his Polish exhibition on July 31 he is going on a month's vacation.

I have heard the most splendid reports of your exhibition "Das Baive Bild der Welt" and want to congratulate you on its

Dear Porter McCray:

I am very much amazed to hear from Mr. Daly that we are not to get the Rothko exhibition and I have for this reason written to Peter Selz.

We make an effort here, and with some success, to show the work of American artists and to foster association with The Museum of Modern Art.

Despite this, I heard today that the Rothko exhibition will eventually go to Recklinghausen. Perhaps, in this case, Baden-Baden will also get it, since we requested it long before.

As I heard it, Sandberg requested the exhibition for Grochowiak. I am very closely associated with Sandberg and visited him in Amsterdam shortly before his trip to America. Naturally at that time we did not speak of Rothko. I am quite convinced that otherwise Sandberg would not have forgotten Baden-Baden.

If necessary, I am prepared to go to you to talk it over; but I heard that you were coming to Europe in November. Perhaps you could come to see us then?

But the question of the Rothko exhibition needs Ex clarification before then. Perhaps it would be simplest if you an Rothko would agree to show it in two places, perhaps for a shorter period of time.

Through Mr. Daly of the Cultural Division of the American Embassy in Bonn, I heard from Porter McCray that we could not have the Rothko exhibition. That disturbs me greatly; what is the reason? I was ready to invitem you here to the opening to make the Opening address.

Please give the enclosed letters to Porter McCray and translate them for him. I am still convinced that a way can be found to show the exhibition in Baden-Baden.

In connection with this Ishould like to say that I make an effort to show yearly exhibitions of American artists. You doubtless already know that in the coming autumn we are showing, in conjunction with the exhition of Fantastic Architecture, the work of Louise Nevelson. At first I wanted to do this through the Cordier Gallery, but they now tell me that they are not sending any more shipments from New York this summer. Because of this, the Cultural Division of the American Embassy, at my request, has provided financial help for the transportation.

Today I hear that Grochowiak in Recklinghausen is getting the Rothko through Sandberg's intervention. I don't know if it's true; but if so, I should like to ask that it be tied in with a Baden-Baden showing.

Dear Peter Selz, such problems always arise. I should be prepared to go abroad again this Fall, if our association required it. In any case, I should like to ask your help with the **Newslass** Louise Nevelson. I am sending you today a copy of my letter to her in which you will tell you all about it.

I am indeed sorry not to have set you on your visit to New York but I have an account of your meeting with Mr. Rasmussen and your expressed interest in a number of exhibitions which we plan to circulate in Europe. I also have spoken of your interest with Mr. Selz and Mr. Seitz, both of whom have recently forwarded to me wour letters recently interpretional ambibitions. to me your letters regarding international exhibitions.

Just today Mr. Drexler, director of the Nuseum's Department of Architecture, has furnished us with his revision of the text and photographic copy of the exhibition Visionary Architecture which I believe you saw last autum. Meanwhile, previous commitments of the International Program's personnel and technical re-sources have accumulated to such an extent that we are obliged to postpone completion of the new design and fabrication of Visionary Architecture until mid-June. Since both Dr. Hammacher of the Kroller-Muller Museum and Dr. Wijsenbeek of the Gemeentenuseum in The Hague made their requests previous to yours, we must give them a choice of the first dates in the schedule. This means that our first showing in Germany could begin either following these two bookings, say in September, or if Rolland were unable to accept it immediately upon the exhibition's arrival in Europe in late July, we could offer the exhibition to you at that time.

The exhibition is now planned to consist of 75 panels each one meter square accompanied by the rather

long text which you observed in New York. As Mr. Rasmusson told you the models are too fragile to travel.

We would consider placing the exhibition in a total of three German cities hoping for a reasonable geographical distribution. I would suggest therefore Baden Baden ass one stop, Munich as a second, and Essen or Dusseldorf as a third, provided a public institution of sufficient prestige is interested. Otherwise we would consider a showing in Berlin or possibly Hamburg.

We are also now making progress in the organization of an exhibition of the last 15 years of Rothko's painting. To some extent this will duplicate portions of the New York exhibition but since these large paintings cannot be rolled but must be shipped fully stretched, the scale of the original show is being reduced by about one-third. Since Mr. Selz is also well committed with his exhibition of Futurism and New Polish Painting he is unable to concentrate on the choice of the Rothko exhibition until summer. We have therefore agreed to open the exhibition's European tour in London in September followed by bookings in Amsterdam, Brussels, Paris, Rome and possibly Basle. I would think we would be able to offer only one showing in Germany: we have so far not been able to intelligently predetermine this choice. I shall certainly welcome your suggestions and it is possible the German date could be integrated into the schedule in the fourth or fifth booking.

Visionary Architecture is offered for a maximum period of four weeks with the understanding that the exhibitor will assume allicosts of transportation and handling from the previous point of exhibition and all expenses in connection with the local showing.

The Rothko exhibition is also offered for a period of not more than 4 weeks and in consideration of the expenses outlined above plus the costs of the local catalog and a prorated share of the sen and European insurance and transportation for the duration of the exhibition's tour. Fortunately, the Holland American Line has granted free transportation to Europe.

I shall be writing you separately regarding the exhibition Modern American Drawings now in preparation

Dr. Mahlew is Director of the Staatliche Kunsthalle in BadenBaden and is also associated with the Institute für Bildender Kunster in
Frankfurt. He is a friend of Peter Sels and has been in New York in
connection with several exhibitions his museum is organizing. He is most

As you perhaps know, the Louisiana Museum was not able to accept our offer of a showing of the ROTHEO exhibition. We have, therefore, decided to offer it to the NY Carlsberg Glyptothek in Copenhagen in the hope that we will yet be able to schedule a showing in Denmark.

I have enclosed a copy of my letter to Dr. Poulsen of the Carlsberg which will indicate that the costs of the exhibition have been substantially reduced. Holland-America Line has contributed free round-trip ocean transportation for the show and an agreement between The Huseum of Modern Art and the European exhibitors has established the insurance charges at \$4,500 (to be shared equally by the exhibitors) with this Museum absorbing any costs over the specified amount. The Carlsberg's costs would be relatively small - insurance plus transportation charges from the previous point of exhi-bition - and I hope this will be an inducement for them to collaborate with us in showing the ROTHRO exhibition.

Thank you for your letter of June 25, 1962 which has been referred to me for reply in Mr. Rasmussen's absence abroad.

Since Mr. Rasmussen's earlier cable to you regarding the possibility of a Milan showing of our MARK ROTHKO exhibition, several factors have arisen which, unfortunately, make it necessary for us to retract our original proposal. The primary reason for this decision is that, in checking the works at the Galleria Nazionale d'Arte Moderna in Rome, Mr. Rasmussen discovered several minor damages which, he felt, made it inadvisable to plan another Italian showing of the Rothko exhibition. As you perhaps know, all of the large Rothko canvases are unframed - because the artist paints the edges of his canvases as well as the front surfaces - since the works have already been packed and unpacked five times in the course of their European tour, these edges have become worn and quite delicate. These conditions prompted Mr. Rasmussen to make arrangements with Dottoressa Bucarelli to retain the Rothko show for the entire summer. In the Fall, the works will be shipped directly to Paris for a showing at the Musée des Arts Décoratifs this committment was made over a year ago and must, of course, be fulfilled. Immediately after the Paris showing, the entire exhibition will be returned to the United States where the works will be returned to their owners.

In addition to the fact that the condition of the Rothko canvases precludes another Italian showing, we have been led to believe that it would be next to impossible to schedule a showing of the exhibition in Milan on such short notice. As you know from our cable of May 4, the Permanente was unable to accomodate the show. The Sindaco of Milan also notified us this week that arrangements could not be made to show the Rothko exhibition in Milan before this Fall because of prior committments.

It was Mr. Rothko himself who suggested to my son, while he was in New York, to look for the possibilities of a showing of his exhibition in Milan, in addition to that in Rome and not instead. This because Mr. Rothko would have liked to have his works shown also here.

My son spoke about this with Mr. McCray and he suggested that possibilities were tried at his return and reported to him to see what could be done in this respect.

We understand that there are very little possibilities to have this exhibition in Milan because, even if it were free in summer 1962, as you certainly, people here are spending their holidays during the summer months and very few people feel like looking at paintings. It is just too hot here.

As far as Leonard Baskin is concerned, this is certainly a highly interesting exhibition but, before we can tell you anything, we should not what kind of works there are and how large the exhibition actually is. Perhaps you could ask the Boymans-van-Beuningen people and those in Berlin, whom we do not know yet, to send us catalogues of their showings. We need both, please. Then we shall visit the exhibition in Paris in November and give you a definite answer.

McCray had remained unanswered, and in apologizing must explain that
his summer has been spent in preparation for extended travels throughout the world as part of a research project for international cultural
exchange. Mr. McCray begins his travels in Australia and the Far East
and will be traveling on his extensive itinerary for at least ten
months.

I do want to assure you that we would be most happy to arrange a Milan showing of the Rothko exhibition, if it is at all possible. At the moment the itinerary is nearly complete, however, and since we have had memorous requests from a good many countries, we felt that the Rome showing which had been requested long ago would have to remain the single Italian showing. However, the final booking next summer has still not been confirmed, and if we do not hear in the near future, I shall let you know in the event that it is not too late to arrange a Milan showing.

As a more immediate possibility, however, I would like to bring to your attention the exhibition of the work of Leonard Baskin which is now circulating in Europe. Our museum organized the exhibition for a first showing at the Museum Boymans-van-beuningen in Notterdam, and it has just concluded a showing in Berlin in connection with the annual Festival of the Arts. In November the exhibition will be shown in Paris at the Centre Culturel Américain. It has received a most lively response for its first two showings and recently Baskin's graphic accomplishments were acknowledged at the Bienel in São Paulo where he was awarded the first prize in printmaking. There are still three remaining bookings in the exhibition's itinerary, which would be approximately on the following schedule:

Thank you for proposing the Mark Rothko exhibition to Moderna Museet. Unfortunately it is quite impossible for us to receive it here in July next year. July and August are impossible months here, the town is almost completely empty, everybody is trying to get the most out of our short summer.

It should of course be very interesting to show Rothkos paintings in Sweden. He is almost completely unknown here, But what we most should like to show at that point is a survey of the actual tendencies in American art, an exhibition of about 6-10 artists. We had a very big show of Sam Francis' works a year ago and is now planning a exhibition of Alfred Leslie and Richard Stankiewicz for November. After that, for 1962, I think the best for us would be an exhibition that showed the American Scene in a broader way than a one-man show can do. As a matter of fact a new exhibition like 12 Americans, containing the best young artists of US would be ideal for Sweden.

However we are very glad and thankful for your kindness to ask us about this exhibition and regret that it is not possible for us to take it.

Dear Hr. Bultôn:

The Museum of Modern Art, under the auspices of The International Council, is sending an exhibition of the work of Mark Rothko to Europe in the fall, with the opening scheduled for September 27th at the Whitechapel Art Callery in London. This exhibition, organized in response to requests from several distinguished European cultural institutions, will present in depth the work of one of America's foremost artists, and I am writing in the hope that the Moderna Museet might collaborate with us in showing Rothko's work in Stockholm. As you know, the last major exhibition of American painting assembled by this Museum for Swedish showing was 12 AMERICANS which was showinin Stockholm in 1953. We feel sure that the Bothke show would be of great interest to the Swedish public and, if your schedule would permit, we would suggest a July 13th Spaning at your suseum. This letter will outline the many details regarding the exhibition's availability, including arrangements for expenses, catalog text and illustrations, dates of showing and installation.

Although it has been necessary to make substitutions for pictures which were not available for circulation, we have maintained the character and quality of the exhibi-tion, so that it gives a belanced retrospective of Rothko's work from 1915 to the present. The exhibition has been reduced from 58 to 48 paintings.

width from 7'10" to 15' with two each 6' x 15'. All converses are being sent unframed, but I am especially anxious to know whether pictures with the largest dimensions, 8'9" x 15' can be safely brought into the gallery. Would you please confirm this at your earliest opportunity.

As it was presented at our Museum in a rather dense installation, the exhibition of 58 paintings compiled nearly 600 running feet of gallery space. Nothko spent a good deal of time with Mr. Selz in planning the installation, and would like to contribute his suggestions for the hanging sequence in your galleries, providing you are able to show the exhibition.

The exhibition is scheduled to open at the Whitechapel Art Gallery in London on September 27th and will run through October 29th. It will then be shown at the Stedelijk Museum in Amsterdam, the Palais des Besux Arts in Brussels, and the Kunsthalle in Basel. Final dates in Paris and Rome after the Basel showing have not been received, but we expect to receive this information very shortly. In the meantime, we would appreciate receiving your response to this proposal as seen as possible, confirming whether a showing from July 13 to August 10 or shortly thereafter would fit within your schedule or listing alternate possibilities in the summer of 1962.

the Duropean costs for the exhibition are being shared equally by the participating museums. These include all costs from the time the exhibition leaves New York, including transportation from New York and return, insurance, local costs of installation, catalog, publicity and transportation from the preceding city on its itinarary. Our Museum has agreed to assume all costs of assembly, preparation and packing in the United States and of supplying the exhibitors with text material and black-and-white photographs for the catalog and information on availability of color illustrations.

For your information in estimating your share of the expenses, we estimate that the costs of round-trip ocean transportation will smound to between \$18,000 and \$20,000. Since the exhibition has not yet been packed, this can only be a rough estimate based upon an expected number of 16 cases with total cubage of approximately 24,00 cubic feet. Final figures are not yet available for the insurance value, but the total will be in the vicinity of \$4.77,000 and coverage for both ocean transits and while on location within Europe would cost approximately \$5,500. Both these expenses would be equitably distributed smong all the European exhibitors; since we are planning on about seven bookings, the total expense to each institution should be between \$3500 and \$4000. We have been notified that the United States Lines has agreed to contribute 50% of the ocean transportation costs and this will substantially reduce the total cost of the exhibition to each participating institution.

b. Illustrations: On the check list of the exhibition I have marked with a red asterisk the five paintings which were reproduced in color in the Museum's catalog, which was printed by Bruder Bartmann, Berlin. Unfortunately, the Museum is unable to lend the color plates, but if you wish you may either request Martmann to prepare electros to send to Stockholm or you may wish to ask them to print the color illustrations for you from the original color plates.

I sincerely hope that you will be able to fit the Bothko exhibition into your schedule and I am positive that, under the suspices of the Boderna Buseet and your own direction, it would be a tremendous success.

Since our achedule of preparation is very pressing, I hope you will be able to cable your reply to this proposal without delay.

Dear Mr. Rasmussen:

Thank you for your letter of July 20 informing us that the Mark Rothko exhibition has been offered to the Museum of Modern Art in Stockholm. We have read your letter to Director Karl Hultén with great interest.

I was told a few days ago when I visited the Museum that Mr. Hultén was on vacation, so thus I have not had the opportunity to discuss the proposed exhibition with him. However, knowing Mr. Hultén's tastes, I would guess that he will be favorably inclined to accept your offer if satisfactory financial arrangements can be made.

During the past few weeks the Museum has featured "Movement in Modern Art", a unique collection ranging from some magnificent Calder mobiles to some bizarre "objects" beyond my ability either to understand or describe. In spite of the fact that a tremendous number of Stockholm residents are absent from the city on holiday at this time, the Museum has been jammed, day after day, with enthusiastic, curious crowds. Mr. Hultén, without a doubt, is a very able promoter as well as director.

Our budget, unfortunately, prohibits us from offering official USIS co-sponsorship, because active participation would involve expenditure of exhibit funds, and these just do not exist for us at the moment.
