- 1. Although it has been necessary to make substitutions for pictures which were not available for circulation, we have maintained the charactor and quality of the exhibition, so that it gives a balanced retrospective of Nothko's work from 1915 to the present. The exhibition has been reduced from 58 to 48 paintings.
- 2. Installation: You will note from the check list that a major section of the show is devoted to the series of murals painted in 1958 and 1959, represented by eight extremely large canvases. Six of these have a standard height of 8'9" with varying widths from 7'10" to 15' with two each 6' x 15'. All convases are being sent unframed, but I am especially ancious to know whether pictures

Our Museum has agreed to assume all costs of assembly, preparation and packing in the United States and of supplying the exhibitors with text material and black-and-white photographs for the catalog and information on availability of color illustrations.

Mr. Robert Giron, Director of the Palais des Beaux-Arts, has asked me to extend to you his most sincere appreciation for having made it possible to show such a full and beautiful collection of Rothko's work in Brussels. I think you will be interested in knowing too that we received word late last month that the Belgian Association of Art Critics had bestowed on the Rothko exhibition its annual prize for the most outstanding exhibition shown in Belgium during the 1961-1962 season.

Before any work was done the painting was photographed. The canvas was then gone over with a vacuum cleaner to remove surface dust. Carbon tetrachloride was used to remove grease and dirt from the fingerprints and smudges especially on the right and left sides of the canvas in the center. The stubborn spots were worked over with a 3% solution of soilax followed by clear water to remove any traces of the soilax. The entire surface of the painting was cleaned with a soft sponge dipped into water and squeezed out; A few of the scratches were minimized and others disappeared completely by painting over them with a small paint brush dipped in xylene. The deeper more difficult scratches were inpainted with shiva casein colors mixed in water and grumbacher casein medium. All other abraided or scratched areas were treated likewise.

I write with deepest apologies for the undue delay regarding the return of your Mark Rothko painting, The Black and The White, which you so generously loaned to our European exhibition of the artist's work. As you may recall, a member of my staff spoke to your secretary about the painting several months ago since it had incurred a few minor damages during the European tour and we hoped to secure your permission to have it restored before making any arrangements to return it to you. At that time, you preferred that no further action be taken until we had received our conservator's written report and could apprise you of its contents.

After innumerable delays, we have now received the written report. I am relieved to tell you that the damages are primarily surface blemishes, consisting of soil and smudges, primarily around the edges and corners of the painting. The top and bottom edges have been abraided also, due to the fact that the painting was circulated without a protective frame so that its painted edges could be seen. Our conservator assures us that he can easily remove the soil and smudges around the edges and also restore the abraided areas without any difficulty. The costs of this work would be covered by the Museum's fine-arts policy.

If you feel this work can be authorized without your advance personal inspection of the canvas, I would appreciate it if you would let me know in writing so that we may proceed with the restoration. If you prefer to inspect the painting before any further arrangements are made, I would be glad to set up an appointment for you to visit our warehouse, where the painting is in temporary storage, at a time which would be convenient to you. We would ask the conservator to be on hand so he could discuss the restoration with you.

CONDITION REPORT

61.1541 Rothko, "The Black and The White", 94 1/8" x 53 3/4", oil on canvas. Owner Or. Frank Stanton.

In my examination of this painting I did not find any major structural damage to the canvas or to the strainer. The painting looks in worse condition than it is because of its surface appearence. The right and left edges of the canvas are heavily marked with grimy finger prints and smudges some of which occurred before the painting traveled in this last Rothko show.

There are pencil marks on the left and right sides evidently put there by someone to mark the hanging hooks on the back of the painting.

The paint film is abraided at all four corners across the front and sides, also the top and bottom. This condition is due mainly to the wear and tear of handling and large unframed painting.

There are scratches and rubs in the pink area across the top and also across the bottom. In the black area at the bottom of the painting there are two smudges near the upper right corner of the area.

SUGGESTED TREATMENT

Clean edges and remove finger prints, minimize scratchs, restore rubbed and abraided areas of the paint film where needed and whatever else is necessary in our opinion to improve the appearence of this painting.

A report of work done and materials used will be furnished upon completion of restoration.

This exhibition, organized in response to requests from several distinguished European cultural institutions, will present in depth the work of one of America's foremost artists, and I am writing in the hope that the Moderna Museet might collaborate with us in showing Rothko's work in Stockholm. As you know, the last major exhibition of American painting assembled by this Museum for Swedish showing was 12 AMERICANS which was shownin Stockholm in 1953. We feel sure that the Bothko show would be of great interest to the Swedish public and, if your schedule would permit, we would suggest a July 13th opening at your museum. This letter will outline the many details regarding the exhibition's availability, including arrangements for expenses, catalog text and illustrations, detes of showing and installation.

1. width from 7'10" to 15' with two each 6' x 15'. All canvases are being sent unframed, but I am especially anxious to know whether pictures with the largest dimensions, 8'9" x 15' can be safely brought into the gallery. Would you please confirm this at your earliest opportunity.

As it was presented at our Museum in a rather dense installation, the exhibition of 58 paintings occupied nearly 600 running feet of gallery space. Nothko spent a good deal of time with Mr. Sels in planning the installation, and would like to contribute his suggestions for the hanging sequence in your galleries, providing you are able to show the exhibition.

The exhibition is scheduled to open at the Whitechapel Art Gallery in London on September 27th and will run through October 29th. It will then be shown at the Stedelijk Museum in Amsterdam, the Palais des Beaux Arts in Brussels, and the Kunsthalle in Basel. Final dates in Paris and Rome after the Basel showing have not been received, but we expect to receive this information very shortly. In the meantime, we would appreciate receiving your response to this proposal as soon as possible, confirming whether a showing from July 13 to August 10 or shortly thereafter would fit within your schedule or listing alternate possibilities in the summer of 1962.

Final figures are not yet available for the insurance value, but the total will be in the vicinity of \$4.77,000 and coverage for both ocean transits and while on location within Europe would cost approximately \$5,500. Both these expenses would be equitably distributed among all the European exhibitors; since we are planning on about seven bookings, the total expense to each institution should be between \$3500 and \$4,000. We have been notified that the United States lines has agreed to contribute 50% of the ocean transportation costs and this will substantially reduce the total cost of the exhibition to seeh participating institution.

Mr. Rothko was present in London for the preview and also assisted the Gallery in planning its installation.

In both Amsterdam and Brussels, the exhibition attracted somewhat smaller audiences and received mixed reviews from the press. Mr. Robert Giron, Director of the Palais des Beaux-Arts, has asked me to extend to you his most sincere appreciation for having made it possible to show such a full and beautiful collection of Rothko's work in Brussels. I think you will be interested in knowing too that we received word late last month that the Belgian Association of Art Critics had bestowed on the Rothko exhibition its annual prize for the most outstanding exhibition shown in Belgium during the 1961-1962 season.

The Kunsthalle in Basel reported that the exhibition had been seen by over 4,000 visitors and that it had been favorably received, both by the press and the general public. In Rome, where the exhibition was on display in the Galleria Nazionale during the summer and early fall of 1962, it attracted thousands of visitors from all over Europe.

The Paris showing of the exhibition, which was originally scheduled at the Musée des Arts Decoratifs, was changed almost at the last minute to the Musée de la Ville de Paris due to circumstances beyond our control. Since the only space the Musée was able to provide on such short notice was not suitable for the exhibition, it was completely renovated under the supervision of Porter A. McCray. In view of the time limitations involved, I feel that it provided quite a handsome setting for the installation. Ambassador Charles Bohlen very generously sponsored the opening ceremony which was attended by many French critics, artists and dealers, as well as representatives of many foreign governments.

I regret that it has taken so long to return your loan, but an unforeseen combination of factors, including the longshoremen's strike and an unusually pressing schedule at our warehouse, has made the delay inevitable.

On behalf of the Museum and The International Council, may I say in closing how deeply your cooperation has been appreciated. In later years, we may

You will see that he has eliminated Sumbers 5, 6, 7, 11 and 17, but as Mamber 17 belongs to a private tollector who has many friends in Paris, I hope it can be placed on one of the large wells with another painting. In any case, we are leaving it in the special check-list we are printing here for the Paris showing.

Both the catelogue and the poster are being printed here, but we cannot proceed until we know exactly what opening date you can appeally -- December 3rd, 19th or 17th. We hope for the 3rd. I am writing further to Mr. Porter McCray's letter of December 15 and my own cable of December 21 in order to confirm the shipping arrangements which you have already agreed to undertake for us in connection with returning the MARK ROTHKO exhibition. Unfortunately, we have not yet received final confirmation from Dr. W.J.H.B. Sandberg, the Director of the Stedelijk Museum in Amsterdam, that the Holland-America Line has agreed to provide free ocean transport for the major portion of the exhibition which is being returned to New York. Since I have already waited until the last possible moment before writing this letter, I would like to request that you preceed on the schedule outlined in my cable and that tentative arrangements be made to forward the U.S. shipment to Rotterdam to meet the February 2 sailing of Holland-America's "Westerdam." I will cable immediately upon receipt of Dr. Sandberg's reply to let you know Holland-America's decision; you should have this cable on or before Wednesday, January 16.

I have enclosed four copies of the box list and customs invoice for the shipment which is to be returned to New York. As is indicated on these lists, this shipment consists of 16 cases marked MCMA 1-16 LONDON," containing 45 paintings with a total value of \$398,300.; the total gross weight of the shipment is 4,545.91 kilos and the cubage is 46.69 cubic Metres. As you already know, no values should be declared to either overland or ocean carriers of this shipment (or of the two shipments to European lenders described on the following page), as our own insurance policy covers all of the works of art at all times. When Drs. Pansa and Meyer have informed you of the names of their receiving agents or have confirmed that their paintings should be returned directly to their own addresses, I would appreciate it if you would arrange to return the works by the safest and speediest overland means possible. We will assume all costs incurred in returning these works. Could you let me know the exact dates on which these works are shipped from Paris, as well as the estimated dates of their arrival at their destinations for our records?

As you know from Mr. NcGray's letter of December 15, Mr. Norman Glass of 30 Rue St. Andre in Paris, will supervise the dismantling and repacking of the entire exhibition. It is especially important that all of the paintings be removed from the galleries in the Musée d'Art Moderne de la Ville de Paris before the morning of January 16; Mr. McGray felt that three workmen would be adequate to complete the work before that time, but if you feel it is absolutely necessary to use four, you may do so. I have forwarded a copy of this letter to Mr. Glass to inform him of these details.

As soon as you have completed all of the shipping arrangements for the U. S. shipment, we would appreciate it if you would let us know the date of its arrival in both Rotterdam and New York. It is possible that Holland-America will not issue a standard bill of lading for the shipment since they have handled some of our past shipments in a special way; if there is a bill of lading, however, I assume that you will forward the required number of copies immediately to our agents, W. R. Heating & Company.

This will confirm our telephone conversation today regarding shipment of the Mark Rothko exhibition to England.

We are most grateful for the generous cooperation of the United States Lines in applying for a fifty per cent reduction on the round-trip transportation costs for the exhibition, and will look forward to the final decision by the United Kingdom Conference. The exhibition will be covered by our Museum's regular fine-arts insurance policy during both transits, and we shall be glad to request that our insurance company furnish the United States Lines with a waiver of indemnity, if that is desired.

We are now counting on a sailing date of August 31, and should like to reserve space on the S. S. United States, if that is possible. Because of our agreement with lenders to the exhibition, we feel that it is essential to arrange shipment on a passenger vessel rather than a freighter. As soon as final figures on the number of cases, weight and cubage are determined, we shall inform your office. Our preliminary estimate indicates that there will be approximately 16 cases with a total cubage of about 2400 cubic feet.

Following its first showing in London in September, the exhibition will travel to Amsterdam, Brussels and Basel, and additional showings are now being negotiated in several other cities. It would be returned to New York late in August 1962.
