Dear Renée:

I have looked through the photographs and condition records on the Motherwell and it seems to me almost certain that the painting is suffering from inherent vice, as you pointed out to the Hempels in your very first letter.

It's true, however, that some areas of cracking evident in the condition photographs sent by the Hempels are not recorded on our condition record sheets, and do not show up in our condition photographs. These are areas particularly in the lower left corner and upper right corner, which cause Mr. Hempel to wonder if the painting could have been pushed at the back. With our backing board, this seems most unlikely.

Could you show the photographs and records to Jean Volkmer to ask her advice? First for her opinion on whether we have any responsibility for the condition, which clearly seems to have progressed since the painting first came to us; and secondly, for advice to give the Hempels as to the necessity or usefulness of restoration.

If the cracking is purely drying cracking, isn't it true that they should not expect any paint losses? And if it were relined, would the surface cracking be corrected or any less evident? And would relining arrest further cracking? If relining doesn't do either of these things, I see no reason to recommend it.

If Jean thinks we have any responsibility for the damage, of course there should be an insurance claim, but that seems unlikely. If there is to be no claim, I think all you can do is to inform the Hempels of possibilities of restoration and leave the decision up to them.

Dear Mrs. Escobedo:

This is to confirm the telephone conversation between your assistant and Mr. Palmer yesterday. We now understand that both the GORKY and the MOTHER-WELL exhibitions were dismantled, packed and booked for shipment to New York on board the M/S LIBREVILLE.

I was surprised to hear that the GORKY drawings had been taken down as well and made ready for shipment, as I was sure that during our telephone con-versation you had agreed to keeping them until they could be shipped on to Australia and had welcomed the idea to keep them on display in your gallery until that time. This is unfortunate, and I hope it did not occur by some misunderstanding during our telephone conversation.

Mr. Palmer asked your assistant to try to halt the shipment of the Corky cases, and she thought it might still be possible. We also received a call from your shipper who seemed to think that approximately four or five boxes. were being shipped. This would indicate that the Gorky exhibition has not been forwarded, and in that case, may we kindly ask you to store them for us in a safe storage space -- or preferably in the University Gallery, until further notice? We should have a reply from Australia within the next two weeks or so. On the other hand, you might prefer to unpack them and install them again, which would be agreable with us, too.

We are now looking forward to receiving the completed publicity report, photos and color slides of the opening and installation, as well as to the press clippings, which Mr. Brown is kind enough to have assembled for us through his press office.

As I mentioned to you on the telephone, we would also very much appreciate receiving a detailed description of how the cases finally managed to get from Guatemala to Mexico. This would be important information for our records and would, of course, be especially valuable if we should have nother exhibition in the future which would have to make its way from Columbia to Mexico.

I enjoyed very much talking with you on the telephone, and I do hope that in the not too distant future I shall have an opportunity to meet you in person -either in New York or in Mexico.

The show will certainly attract many of the 90,000 students at the National University, as well as many persons prominent in the capital's cultural life who live in Pedregal and in other areas adjacent to the University. Helen Escobedo is making color transparencies of the exhibit, which I am sure that she will be forwarding to you. Also I am asking our Press Section to assemble clippings for me which I shall pass on to you.





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Dear Mr. Rasmussen:

This concerns the Gorky-Motherwell exhibition which should have taken place at the Museo de Artes y Ciencias of the National Autonomous University of México the first days of April and which due to extraneous circumstances for which you and we are blameless, cannot take place, since it <u>cannot kkexkhippedxframxRagekaxbeforexAprikxl2kk</u> is likely that it cannot be shipped from Bogota before April 12th. Considering that this would be during Holy Week and that customs officials will not be working those days, we would not be certain of clearance until the 15th or 16th of April. Figuring installation time, we could open on the 20th, which means we would have the show for two weeks.

Given the high cost of the catalogue, insurance,) transportation, installation etc., you will understand that this is not justified for such a short time at such a high price.

You offered us a longer exhibition period but unfortunately the museum has prior commitments which cannot be avoided.





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

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Mr. Rasmussen has asked that I send you a copy of his letter of earlier today to Sra. Carmen Barreda which brings up the possibility of showing our exhibitions, DRAWINGS BY ARSHILE CORKY and ROBERT MUTHERWELL WORKS ON PAPER, in Moxico City. Both are extremely beautiful shows which cover in some depth, the work of both of these artists on paper: we feel they could, if shown together, make a considerable impact in Mexico.

Unfortunately, I cannot enclose a copy of the catalogue of the exhibitions publiched recently in Buenos Aires as we have sent our only copy to Sra. Barreda. However, I have enclosed for your information, copies of the checklists of both exhibitions, an earlier catalogue of the Gorky show published by the Arts Council of Great Britain (please note that this catalogue lists only 50 drawings and that there are now actually 55 in the show as is indicated on the separate checklist and boxlists).

We would be very grataful for any assistance you could give us in scheduling the exhibitions in Mexico City and in encouraging Srs. Barreds to give us at least a tentative answer as soon as possible. If the Museo de Arte Moderno is unable to schedule the shows on such short notice, do you think they would attract wide attention if shown at the University under Mrs. Escobedo's suspices and, if so, could you possibly discuss them with her.

I hope you will forgive our bringing this matter to your attention so late but can assure you of our gratitude for your help. Mrs. New has made considerable progress on the new collection for the Residence and will doubtless be in touch with your shortly after she returns from a brief vacation. At this point, however, we do not expect to be able to forward the works until sometime in February.

As you know from our cable of the 18th of this month, on that date we received the completion of the works comprising the Gorky-Motherwell exhibition. We hope you have already received the Arrival Notice and the Condition Report, which we have sent you forthwith.

Since we did not receive the report on the condition of the works as they left New York according to which we were to have made our comparative examination of flaws the works may have suffered, we have been guided by only the observation of the works.

The boxes are in good state, except for a minor flaw on the outside of Box #5. Regarding the works, Motherwell's <u>la Cuisiniere</u> No. 67.1220, the cardboard on which the work is done has become slightly detached and has slipped a bit to the right inferior corner. In the work <u>In Sienna with black stripe</u> No. 67.1250 also Motherwell, there is a detachment in the interior part of the frame. Since in neither of the two instances the works appear affected, we have not indicated this on the report meant to show damages.

We are dealing with Mr. Palmer relative to the shipment of the exhibition to México. In our cable of yesterday, we inform him that neither Braniff nor Avianca nor any other transport company operate between Bogotá and México with airplanes with ample enough door (space) to transport the boxes.

We thought it also convenient to inform Mr. Palmer that our information is that at present there are no cargo flights between Miami and México. Due to this we have the impression that it is improbable that the works could arrive in México on April 15th even if they left Bogotá on the 11th or 12th of this month, which we intend doing.

In any case, attending the wishes of Mr. Palmer, we inaugurate on Monday 25th of this month and close on Sunday April 7th. We think we'll be able to deliver the **shipment** cargo to the company indicated by the Museum, approximately the 10th of the month.

As you meanwhile know from Mrs. Escobedo, whom Miss Annette Allwardt telephoned last evening, we were finally able to determine that the cargo airline, AVIATEDA, flies from Miami to Mexico City via Guatemala City and, since, as you cabled us, you will be able to ship the exhibition to Miami by April 11, it will be able to make an immediate connection with Aviatecs's Friday flight to Guatemala City at approximately 3:00 o'clock in the morning. It would therefore be mandatory that the exhibition leave Bogota in time to make the Miami connection on April 12, since the next Aviateca flight does not leave Miami until April 16, which would make it too late for them due to holidays that week. I am now awaiting Mrs. Escobedo's cable confirmation that all has been arranged.

We will soon be looking forward to your report on the opening on Monday. I hope you have been able to arrange for having color slides and black-and-white photos taken at the occasion. We shall be most interested in seeing them, as well as press reports and, of course, the catalogue you have prepared. We wish you the best of luck on the 25th.

SUMMARY OF TELEPHONE CONVERSATION BETWEEN ANNETTE ALIWARDT AND HELEN ESCOBEDO (BOGOTA):

I told Mrs. Escobedo that the exhibition could leave from Miami only via AVIATECA which would take it down to Guatemala and the next day straight to Mexico City. I informed her that there are two <u>regularly</u> scheduled flights leaving Miami every <u>Tuesday</u> and <u>Friday</u>, and that the exhibition would have to leave Bogota no later than the 11th in order to connect with the Friday flight in Miami, on April 12. This would get the exhibition to Mexico on Saturday, the 13th of April.

I then checked with her whether she could at all consider accepting the exhibitition in case it could not leave Bogota as early as the llth in which case it would only connect with the Tuesday flight, on the following Tuesday, the 16th and get the exhibition to Mexico on Wednesday, the 17th.

She replied that this was too late, considering that there are holidays between the 17th and the 20th (the date of her opening being the 20th).

So the only possible chance of getting the exhibition to Mexico would be to ship it out of Bogota no later than the llth of April.

Then Mrs. Escobedo wanted me to give her a goahead for the printing of the catalogue. I said I could not absolutely guarantee whether the exhibition could make the connection in Miami on the 12th, since I have no way of knowing whether Mr. French can get the exhibition off on time. But I told her the contents of his cable, i.e. that he would close on the 7th and would be able to get it on a flight no later than the 11th. Therefore all the conditions were given for getting the exhibition to Mexico on time. I said that the final decision of getting all operations underway in Mexico would rest in Mrs. Escobedo's hands. I suggested that she call Mr. French in Bogota and tell him about the AVIATECA flight from Miami and ascertain that he will definitely be able to get the exhibition to Miami by the 12th. Only on that factor it would depend whether she should go ahead with the printing of the catalogue.

She said she would call Mr. French and then wire us her final decision.

March 11, 1968 Dear Miss Allwardt: This is in reply to your letter of March 6, which we just received, regarding the GORKY and MOTHERWELL exhibitions which will soon be shown in this Library.

Please be informed of the following: Mr. Arroyo of the Museo de Bellas Artes in Caracas wrote to us that the works had been shipped via Pan American to Panama. There, Mr. Arroyo tells us, it was hoped to transfer them to the Braniff airline which would have been in charge to ship them to Bogota. After making some investigations, we learned that Braniff has no cargo planes to Bogota. The office of Pan American in this city tells us that the works had been shipped from Panama to Miami to be transshipped to Avianca Airlines which would ship it to Bogota in one of its cargo planes.

The latter, however, has not taken place, and we suspect, therefore, that the cases are still in Miami waiting to be moved to Colombia. Since the cargo flights are extremely irregular and subject to many delays, we do not know when the works will be shipped, nor whether they will arrive here all in one shipment.

We wanted to inform you of these developments which do not cease to worry us, especially as they may just force us to change the date of our inauguration. We will, on our part, of course try to effect transportation of the works to Mexico, once the exhibition has closed here, in such a fashion as not to alter the date of the opening which they have in mind. Nevertheless, we are unable to guarantee that the showing here will be realized precisely as we had envisioned it, since, as we mentioned, all cargo flights are quite irregular in their departures and arrivals.

As soon as we have in our possession the works in their entirety, we shall send you a report on the condition in which we found them on their arrival. We shall also send you the catalogues and posters for the exhibition in question.

Thank you very much for your letter of February 14 to Mr. Palmer reconfirming the date of the GORKY/MOTHERWELL epening in Bogota. As I wrote to you on February 17, we, of course, agreed to the March 21 opening date after learning that you had already fixed it on your schedule.

We are, however, very anxious to see the exhibition packed and shipped to Mexico City as quickly as possible after it closes in Bogotá on April 11. The loan period of sbme of the works in the exhibition cannot be extended beyond the end of May, and the exhibition will therefore have to be returned to New York by that time. In order that the Mexico City opening can be scheduled for the latter part of April, I hope you will be able to have the exhibition packed and dispatched no later than three or four days after it closes.

Although the exhibition should be consigned to Mr. John Brown at the American Embassy in Mexico City, the transportation and installation will be handled directly by the Universidad Nacional Autónoma de Mexico, and I have written today to Mrs. Helen Escobedo, Director of the Department of Fine Arts, asking her to be in touch with you regarding transportation.

This morning we received a cable from Mr. Arroyo in Caracas informing us that the exhibition has been shipped to Bogotá, and I hope that it will arrive safely and that customs formalities will go smoothly.

As soon as the exhibition has been received, I would appreciate the speedy return of the Arrival Notice form sent you earlier. After the exhibition has been unpacked, we should appreciate having the completed CONDITION REPORT as soon as possible. In checking the condition of the works, would you let us know which of the Gorky works have labels on the plexiglas (we heard from Mr. Arroyo that the exhibitor in Buenos Aires had affixed labels directly to the plexiglas on some of the Gorky works, contrary to our instructions and are anxicous to know how many this has affected). If possible, could you also advise how the labels appear to have been affixed.



We assume it will be possible to make advance arrangements with Colombian customs so that the exhibitions cases can be opened for customs inspection after they reach the Biblioteca.
