Dear Ms. le Fever-Barents:

I have waited to write to you until hearing from Tel Aviv that the EDWARD WESTON exhibition had arrived. Yesterday, we received a telegram expressing great enthusiasm for the exhibition, so we are assuming that everything went well.

I have not received any of the publicity materials including slides, photographs and clippings which I requested earlier and which you promised to send me when we spoke. Could I remind you to send these at your earliest convenience? I will also be needing the Shipping Record and Publicity Report forms. Besides the reaction of your public, we would also be very interested in having your reactions to the exhibition.

According to our agreement, I enclose our official Invoice in the amount of \$4000. covering the rental fee for your showing of the EDWARD WESTON exhibition at the Stedelijk Museum.

As for participants share in transportation costs: the Tel Aviv Museum is covering the costs of round-trip air freight Amsterdam-Tel Aviv-London. This leaves Amsterdam and London for sharing the costs of getting the exhibition to Europe and back to New York. I think the simplest is for the Stedelijk to pay the cost of shipment to Europe while The Arts Council of Great Britain covers the return shipment. For your information, I am enclosing a copy of Keating's bill which we have already paid in the amount of \$1,170.99. I also enclose our own Invoice in the same amount which I would appreciate your re-imbursing directly to the Museum of Modern Art.

Dear Mr. de Wilde:

I am very sorry I could not write you earlier concerning the EDWARD WESTON exhibition. I have had to check with various people about the budget which unfortunately is sometimes a problem.

As you know, besides yourselves, both the Hayward Gallery and the Centre Beaubourg have expressed interest in presenting the exhibition pending the financial arrangements. We can now definitely establish the rental fee at \$4000. for each participant in the tour based on there being three. Round-trip air freight transportation to Europe and on the continent would also be shared among the three participants. For your information, there are six travelling cases weighing 2,337 lbs. Based on current rates, our shipping agent estimates that one-way air freight shipment costs about \$2000. As usual, the exhibition would be fully insured under our regular Fine Arts Insurance policy.

As you note very rightfully, there must be three participants for the tour to materialize. I have made note of your preferred choice of dates i.e. October 15 through November 28, 1976 for the Stedelijk Museum.

The feeling at MoMA is that we cannot approach the lenders to the exhibition to ask them to extend their loans unless we can tell them that we have three definite bookings. I am writing to Malitte Matta at the Musée National d'Art Moderne, who has written to us about a Paris showing, and I am also contacting The Arts Council of Great Britain who is arranging the London showing. As soon as all the responses are in, we will contact the lenders.

Dear Mr. Solley:

I write to request a special favor in regard to the photograph by Edward Weston which you have kindly loaned to our forthcoming retrospective. The problem is that Mr. Szarkowski and Mr. Van Dyke hodecided to frame all the prints on silver paper (work made since the late 1920s) in 14" x 17" frames—a technique that has worked with every single silver print in the exhibition except one of the two on loan from you. This work is: Cattle skulls in a ring, 1937, acc. no. 64.53.62, (15" x 16%). In order for this important work to be used in the exhibition it would be necessary to trim in from the mount (1" from the top and in from the bottom) to bring the mat down to 14". The men in our frame shop are expert and, fortunately, no information would be lost in the trimming. Of course, I will not touch this work without authorization from you.

It is my sincere feeling that the work as it is presently mounted does not represent Weston's vision as it is embodied in more than 200 photographs we have assembled for this exhibition. This mount is clearly an anomaly, deviating from the norm, and I believe that in trimming it slightly and in presenting it as the directors of the exhibition wish to do, Edward Weston's intention will be truly served.

I would deeply appreciate your letting me know your thoughts in this pressing matter as soon as possible.



The Museum of Modern Art is presently planning a major retrospective exhibition of the work of EDWARD WESTON, which will be presented in New York from January 27 through March 30, 1975. As it will be the first critical review of the photographer's work since the exhibition directed by Nancy Newhall was shown here in 1946, the Museum is especially eager to make the show available to a small group of other institutions in the United States following its New York showing.

The exhibition, which will contain approximately 250 photographs, will be selected from the Museum's own Weston holdings, and will also draw on a number of other important public and private collections. It is anticipated that virtually all of the prints to be included will have been made by the photographer himself or directly under his supervision.

Willard Van Dyke, an intimate friend of Weston's from 1929 onwards and until recently director of the Department of Film of the Museum, has agreed to serve as Guest Director of the exhibition. A distinguished photographer himself before turning to film, Mr. Van Dyke brings a profound and precise sensibility to the work and the intentions of his friend and mentor. His love and understanding of Weston and his work is documented in his film, The Photographer, which he did on Weston in 1947, and which remains one of the best films dealing with the art of photography.

A checklist of the exhibition will be available later in the year following completion of our loan arrangements. In the meantime, I can advise you that we expect to install the show in our Garden Wing Gallery which has a total of 5,300 square feet of space. The Museum of Modern Art is presently planning a major retrospective exhibition of the work of EDWARD WESTON, which will be presented in New York from January 27 through March 30, 1975. As it will be the first critical review of the photographer's work since the exhibition directed by Nancy Newhall was shown here in 1946, the Museum is especially eager to make the show available to a small group of other institutions in the United States following its New York showing.

The exhibition, which will contain approximately 250 photographs, will be selected from the Museum's own Weston holdings, and will also draw on a number of other important public and private collections. It is anticipated that virtually all of the prints to be included will have been made by the photographer himself or directly under his supervision.

Willard Van Dyke, an intimate friend of Weston's from 1929 onwards and until recently director of the Department of Film of the Museum, has agreed to serve as Guest Director of the exhibition. A distinguished photographer himself before turning to film, Mr. Van Dyke brings a profound and precise sensibility to the work and the intentions of his friend and mentor. His love and understanding of Weston and his work is documented in his film, The Photographer, which he did on Weston in 1947, and which remains one of the best films dealing with the art of photography.

A checklist of the exhibition will be available later in the year following completion of our loan arrangements. In the meantime, I can advise you that we expect to install the show in our Garden Wing Gallery which has a total of 5,300 square feet of space. We do not yet have an accurate figure on the running footage of wall space which would be required for the exhibition but a preliminary estimate from John Szarkowski, who will be installing the show here, indicates it will be in the vicinity of 450 feet.

The exhibition will be available for showings of approximately six weeks duration beginning in May, 1975 and running through June, 1976. Based on projected costs and the fact that the tour will be limited to 3 or 4 additional showings, we are charging a rental fee of \$4,000. plus pro-rated transport costs. We will not be in a position to estimate transport costs until the tour has begun to take shape.

I have just had a chance to speak with Mr. Szarkowski concerning your recent request regarding Edward Weston illustrations.

I have been asked to remind you that the Museum cannot grant rights to reproduce photographs for a catalogue, unless these pictures are in the public domaine, or unless we have received specific permission for this purpose. In the case of the Edward Weston photos, clearance must be negotiated with Cole Weston.

If you feel the copy prints we sent you earlier were not good enough, please return them and we will have new ones printed. You are, of course, free to buy from Cole Weston, prints from the original negatives, but in any event we assume that the selection of prints for any publication that you might produce will be selected from pictures included in our exhibition. If you wish to request a different selection from us, please identify the picture using our Checklist number, since the titles are often repeated.

The Tel Aviv showing for the EDWARD WESTON exhibition was indeed a sudden development. We were meeting with the new director, Marc Scheps, and he was able to make arrangements to receive the exhibition for a January/February showing. The Tel Aviv Museum is covering the costs for round-trip air freight transportation, Amsterdam-Tel Aviv-London. Since our original agreement stipulated that participants share transportation costs for getting the exhibition to Europe and back and there are only yourselves and the Stedelijk, I think the simplest method is for Amsterdam to pay the cost of shipment to Europe while The Arts Council covers the return shipment. For your information, air freight to Europe came to nearly \$1200.

Although we still don't have definite confirmations from Amsterdam and Paris concerning the EDWARD WESTON exhibition, I thought I would write you with what information I do have.

As you know, besides yourselves, both the Stedelijk Museum and the Centre Beaubourg have expressed interest in presenting the exhibition pending the financial arrangements. We can now definitely establish the rental fee at \$4000. for each participant in the tour based on there being three. Round-trip air freight transportation to Europe and on the continent would also be shared among the three participants. For your information, there are six travelling cases weighing 2,337 lbs. Based on current rates, our shipping agent estimates that one-way air freight shipment costs about \$2000. As usual, the exhibition would be fully insured under our regular Fine Arts Insurance policy.

In order for the tour to materialize at all, there must be three participants. The Stedelijk Museum has reserved the dates October 15 through November 28, 1976. For the Hayward Gallery, I have reserved the period late February/March 1977. I have written to Malitte Matta at the Musee National d'Art Moderne to have them consider presenting the exhibition in Paris either directly before, or directly after the Amsterdam showing.

The feeling at MoMA is that we cannot approach the lenders to the exhibition to ask them to extend their loans unless we can tell them that we have three definite bookings. As soon as all the responses are in, assuming they are positive, we will contact the lenders.

Under separate cover, I am forwarding a copy of the Aperture monograph on Edward Weston which was specially reprinted for our Museum showing last spring. It sells for \$7.50. If you would be interested in

I am writing in response to your letter of August 11th to Dennis Longwell, in which you suggest that a payment of \$600 would be an appropriate payment to reimburse the Department of Special Collections for the trimming of the mount of your Weston photograph Penamints, Death Valley, 1938. (Loan No. 74.663)

I want to repeat that our error in trimming this mount was a very unfortunate mistake, and I do hope that you will accept my sincere apologies that this happened while the print was in our custody. It is clear that the value of the object has been lessened, in antiquarian terms if not aesthetic ones, and that this Museum is obligated to pay for this loss.

I am however surprised that the amount at which you appraise the loss, which is 80 per cent of the value at which the Library asked that the print be insured.

I would suggest that the original domaions of the mount could be restored by an over-mat. If the Library's Weston collection is in active use and available for study, open mats would in any event be indicated as a means of protecting the prints' delicate surfaces.

It is doubtful that any purpose would be served by a detailed analysis of the letters from Mrs. Thompson and Mr. Hawkins. Perhaps I should confess that I do not believe that Mr. Hawkins' estimate of loss would be sustained by other dealers.

Like you, I would like to resolve this matter without further delay. I would suggest that \$250 would be a rational figure for settlement. If this is acceptable, the Museum will send its check in this amount to the Department of Special Collections.

Again, please accept my deep regrets that this distressing error was made.

Although we appreciate the nature of your request and your desire for uniformity in your exhibit, we must refuse your request to trim the two mats about which you wrote.

It may very well be that Weston trimmed his later mats and developed a presentation with which he was pleased. In fact, he might have, had he some upon these ver prints, trimmed the mats himself. But he didn't. And as such they remain a part of the history of his development, a revelation of his perception. It would be a betrayal of our role in the conservation and preservation of historical materials to alter them.

I consulted with Dodie Thompson in case there might be some factor which might alter our decision. The told me that such size mats are not as uncommon as you seem to think, although they are perhaps not represented among those prints you have selected for exhibition. It was not until some years later that he settled on a size which you feel represents his "vision".

I'm sorry to have to say no to you. If you would like to substitute two other prints which would conform, we should certainly be happy to lend them.

I write to request a special favor in regard to two of the prints by Edward Weston which you have kindly loaned to our forthcoming retrospective. The problem is that Mr. Szarkowski and Mr. Van Dyke have decided to frame all the prints on silver paper in 14"x 17" frames—a technique that has worked with every single silver print in the exhibition except two on loan from you. These are: Sand Dunes, Death Valley, 1938 (15" x 16½") and Kelp, 1932 (14 7/8" x 15½"). In order for these works to be used in the exhibition it would be necessary to trim 1" from the first (½" from the top and bottom of the original mat) and slightly less from the second so that each could be brought down to 14". The men in our frame shop are expert and, fortunately, no information would be lost in the trimming. Of course, I will not touch these works without authorization from you.

It is my sincere feeling that the works as they are presently mounted do not represent Weston's vision/embodied in more than 200 photographs we have assembled for this exhibition. These are clearly anomalies—deviations from the norm—and I believe that in trimming them slightly and in presenting them as the directors of the exhibition wish to do, Edward Weston's intention will be truly served.

Please let me know your thoughts in this matter at your earliest convenience.

The exhibition, which will contain approximately 250 photographs, will be selected from the Museum's own Weston holdings, and will also draw on a number of other important public and private collections. Willard Van Dyke, an intimate friend of Weston's from 1929 onwards and until recently director of the Department of Film of the Museum, has agreed to serve as Guest Director of the exhibition. The exhibition, which will contain approximately 250 photographs, will be selected from the Museum's own Weston holdings, and will also draw on a number of other important public and private collections. It is anticipated that virtually all of the prints to be included will have been made by the photographer himself or directly under his supervision.

Willard Van Dyke, an intimate friend of Weston's from 1929 onwards and until recently director of the Department of Film of the Museum, has agreed to serve as Guest Director of the exhibition. A distinguished photographer himself before turning to film, Mr. Van Dyke brings a profound and precise sensibility to the work and the intentions of his friend and mentor. His love and understanding of Weston and his work is documented in his film, The Photographer, which he did on Weston in 1947, and which remains one of the best films dealing with the art of photography.

A checklist of the exhibition will be available later in the year following completion of our loan arrangements. In the meentime, I can advise you that we expect to install the show in our Garden Wing Gallery which has a total of 5,300 square feet of space. We do not yet have an accurate figure on the running footage of wall space which would be required for the exhibition but a preliminary estimate from John Szarkowski, who will be installing the show here, indicates it will be in the vicinity of 450 feet.

The exhibition will be available for showings of approximately six weeks duration beginning in May, 1975 and running through June, 1976. Based on projected costs and the fact that the tour will be limited to 3 or 4 additional showings, we are charging a rental fee of \$4,000. plus pro-rated transport costs. We will not be in position to estimate transport costs until the tour has begun to take shape.

Because of the excellent publications on Weston already available, the Museum is not planning to do a new one in conjunction with the exhibition. It is hoped, however, that it may be possible to have the popularly priced 1971 Aperture monograph on Weston by Nancy Newhall reprinted and, if this works out, copies would be made available to exhibiting institutions at a substantial discount off the list price. An estimated unit price is not available at this time as negotiations are currently underway with Aperture.

If you are interested in participating in the tour, I would be grateful for an early response and would appreciate it if you could provide a preliminary idea of what showing periods might be accommodated in your schedule.
