Ten years ago this spring, ten artists opened their studios to the public for three weekends. This cooperative effort, called 10 DOWNTOWN, offered one of the first alternatives to the commercial gallery system. In fact, 10 DOWNTOWN predates all the Soho galleries, with the exception of the funded Park Place Gallery (closed in 1968). It was a very successful show, and has since established a reputation in the art world unique in tis independence and longevity. For 10 successive years the original, independent character of 10 DOWNTOWN has been preserved, and the exhibition has never come under the influence of a particular group or individual. This in itself is unique in the art world. Each group of artists chooses the following that year's, group of 10. Thus the selection process has remained fresh and vital, unaffected by ulterior circumstances (e.g. "themes," politics, stylistic manifestoes, reigning "taste," "in-out ideas").

PROPOSAL

The spring of 1977 marks the tenth anniversary season of 10 DOWNTOWN. To commemorate the occasion, the artists who have participated since 1968 would like to organize a large-scale exhibition of their work during the fall of 1977.

We need a sponsor or group of sponsors to assist us in the following ways:

- 1. To provide or help locate a space or several concurrent spaces for the show.
- 2. To assist the artists with the organization and administration of the show.
- 3. To help with the funding of the show. As 10 DOWNTOWN does not have a continuing corporate structure, it needs a non-profit organization through which to apply for and receive funds.
- 4. To assist in the preparation and publication of a catalogue.

The exact nature of the exhibition would depend upon the type of space available. A very large museum-like space would allow each artist to contribute a piece. The spring of 1977 marks the tenth anniversary season of 10 DOWNTOWN. To commemorate the occasion, we artists who have participated since 1968 are planning a large-scale exhibition of our work during the fall of 1977.

We are currently applying to the New York State Council on the Arts for funding for a catologue and a visual presentation of the history of 10 DOWNTOWN (slides, large photos, text, etc. to accompany a major exhibition.) Lawrence Alloway has offer to write the introduction to the catologue. Artists' Space has been of assistance to us and 112 Greene Street Gallery has offered us space in November 1977 to be used in conjunction with a museum.

It is our hope that the Brooklyn Museum would be interested in sponsoring this exhibition by providing gallery space and an administration for the show.

We feel that 10YEARS OF 10 DOWNTOWN would be both an Artistically and historically interesting exhibition. It is simultaniously thematic and representative of a broad spectrum of contemporary attitudes in the visual arts. As it emmenates from the artists themselves, not from the commercial interest, it presents a unique and interesting view of a decade of art produced in New Yorks loft district. The decade in which this locallity has become the recognized international art center.

Excepting the funded Park Place Gallery-which closed in 1968, 10 DOWNTOWN pre-dates all the galleries in the Soho area. It was the first major event to draw a great deal of critical attention to itself and to the area. It is difficult to assess the magnitude of its impact in view of the dramatic changes that have occured since 1968. 10 DOWNTOWN was born out of need. For the artists who wanted to exhibit their work, there werefew options. The 10th Street Galleries of the 50's had closed down. There were virtually no acceptable alternatives to the commercial galleries, which by numbers alone, were essentially closed to most artists-regardless of merit. Perhaps a measure of the impact that 10 DOWNTOWN had was the speed with which commercial galleries moved into the area. By 1970 Paula Cooper, OK Harris, Hundred Acres, and Max Hutchenson were established.

But its impact was not only to herold the coming of a new "Arts District." More importantly, it introduced the notion itself of the need for diversity. The idea that alternative modes of exhibition are both desirable and emmenantly successful. It generated a model for the subsequent development of on going alternatives to the commercial gallery system (112 Greene Street Gallery, Artists' Space, and the Clocktower.) It extablished a precedent for artistrun events such as the Soho Street Festival of 1970, artistrun organizations such as AIR, the Women's Interarts Center, and the co-operative galleries.







Our Exhibition at P.S. 1 is proceeding well. Over 70 of us have given their consent and returned the form with some portion of the requested \$50. contribution.

Each artist will be responsible for delivering his/her own piece of work to P.S. 1 (Girl's Entrance) at 46-01 21st Street, Long Island City, Queens, between the hours of 10 to 6 from Wednesday, August 31st through Friday, September 2nd and during the following week, on Tuesday, September 6th and Wednesday, September 7th, also from 10 to 6.

Lawrence Alloway with the help of a Ten Downtown Installation Committee, headed by Lynn Mayo and George Cole, will begin installing the Exhibition on Wednesday September 7th. The Exhibition is open to the public from 1 PM on Sunday the 11th. P.S. 1 hours are 1-6 Thursday through Sunday.

Once again, the work you select to show is your own choice and it need not be work shown originally in your year. It can be recent work. Please label work and attach a 3"x5" index card with your name, title, dimensions, materials, etc.

DIRECTIONS TO P.S. 1:

BY CAR: Midtown Tunnel, exit just past toll booth, 21st St. and Van Alst, right at first light on to 21st St., continue 3 blocks to 46th Road

BY SUBWAY: 1. #7 Flushing Line at Times Square or Grand Central to Hunter's Point exit

2. E or F Train to 23rd St./Ely Avenue exit. Walk three

All delivery and pick up as well as any cost is the responsibility of the individual artist. We have neither the funds or the manpower to organize a mass pick up of work. It seemed easier and more practical for each person or a group of friends to work it out within the delivery times noted. Someone will be there to sign in and accept the work.

At the conclusion of the show all work will have to be removed from P.S. 1 on October 3rd or 4th to allow time for clean up and installation of the following show.

Works will be insured during the course of the Exhibition and a gallery attendant will be present when the show is open to the public.

POSTERS AND INVITATIONS have gone to the printer. Posters will be pasted up outdoors around NYC. Invitations will be mailed to a basic list of 2000 provided by the Institute for Art and Urban Resources. You can pick up 100 invitations for your personal list at the Clocktower, 108 Leonard Street, or at P.S. 1, when you deliver your work.

TEN DOWNTOWN TEN YEARS

Ten years ago ten artists living in lofts downtown banded together to challenge the monpoly of the exhibition and sales of art by the uptown galleries. The raw rock protest movements of the sixties finally reached and shattered the cloistered confines of the uptown establishment. An explosion of energy, effort and art blew away the facade of Madison Avenue. Blowing in the wind of the sixties was the realisation that the work didn't end when the brush was laid down. To do art was to show art. To do your own thing meant to do everything.

If the uptown galleries were to few their spaces were also to tight and cramped for the raw energy brewing downtown. Painters and sculptors no longer bent over easels or labored over pedestals. A time of massive a marches and mamouth rock concerts demanded paintings and sculptures of equal scale to capture the boundless involvement of the sixties.

It required space. And just below Houston Street they found it in the vacant lofts of a declining forgotten commercial neighborhood. Like many other protest actions it was also illegal in the statutes of the times. Countless hours were spent in the corridors of the bureaucracy to enable one to place that small black and white plaque on the door with the letters A.I.R. and the floor number. The Fire Department wanted to know what floor had an Artist In Residence in case of a fire. It was a doomed dilapidated neighborhood more likely to burn down that to rise up to be SOHO.

And so they together, Creston, Jorgensen, Van de Bovenkamp, Baringer, Colub, Wiegand, Tobias, Ginnever, Montgomery, and Aptekar and called themselves TEN DOWNTOWN. They all had magnificent space to show in their large loft studios so they only had to sput out an invitation, paste up some posters and send out their press release to invite the public to come see today's work today. In three weekends 6000 people trooped through their studios. It was a stupendous success. Unheard of.

As it began it continued. Each year a new group of ten taking up the concept and after the Spring loft openings passing it on to a new group of ten. A unique non-institutional institution of independent artists keeping the concept alive and thriving for ten years. Much was begun in the sixties- little of it still remains.

From TEN DOWNTOWN also came SOHO. In a few years West Broadway was the scene of a thriving new art community. Galleries, both co-op and private, lined the streets; bars, boutiques and barbershops weren't far behind. If it wasn't nirvana at least it was whole new world in which to work. TEN DOWNTOWN reasserted the primacy of the artist, the stranglehold of the uptown galleries was broken and the EMERGIENCE EMERGIENCE ENERGY EN
