Dear Rebecca,

Thank you for letting me make duplicate slides of the Public Mirror: Artists Against Racial Prejudice exhibition. As you had stated over the phone, the slides are very underexposed. I am writing to let you know of my disappointment and anger when I paid the \$70 for these dupes.

As you know, in late July 1990, I was approached by Tom Finkelpearl about a September slot in the 1990-91 programming of the Institute of Contemporary Art, Clocktower Gallery. The Institute was interested in having Artists Against Racial Prejudice replace a project that fell through. We responded enthusiastically; and in less than a month, AARP mounted what I thought was a focused and poignant exhibition of diverse experiences on racism. Given the time factor, proper preparations for funding was not made which meant that any form of a catalogue was out of the question. Also, in the vague agreement, the coordinator's fee never materialized. I did not pursue this because my concern was to have proper documentation.

I cannot convey the disappointment and anger the evening I picked up the slides. Yes, the feelings were escalated by the dark news of war, but the realization that there is no documentation of the determination, the effort and the unity that went into putting this show together was devastating. I am not familiar with the Institute's policies, but I sincerely hope that this does not reflect its attitude toward marginal groups. As coordinator and representative of AARP, I cannot help but feel slighted by the unprofessionalism on the Institute's behalf; and I am voicing my dissent in hope that these miscalculations do not repeat itself.

It was a delightful and bonding experience working with you. I look forward to future projects together.

Dear Ken:

I just received your letter this morning and of course it upset me, but I am trying to see the situation from your perspective. I know it is a disgrace that those slides were so dark and I was very disappointed when I finally received them from Liz after the exhibition had come down.

Last fall we had to make a lot of hard decisions about cutting our budget. This year like many other institutions we are facing drastic cuts. The D.C.A. alone has cut \$40,000 from our annual budget, and we are not yet sure what the cuts from NYSCA and the NEA will total. One plan to curtail expenses was to not hire professional photographers and try to document shows in-house. I asked for Hank Stahler's advice about this and he said that he thought Liz would be able to handle the job. Liz was under the impression that these slides were purely for archival purposes, and as such did not have to be professional quality (she also bought the wrong kind of film). It was my fault that I didn't make sure Liz knew exactly what she was doing. Since this experience we no longer use Liz, we have Hank come in to take the pictures. The other problem was that Liz took these photographs on the last day of the exhibition, so that once I found out what had happened it was impossible to remedy the situation.

I was totally unaware that you had given up a curatorial fee in order that the show be documented professionally. If I had known this I could have argued this point in the effort to get a professional. I also wish that you had talked to me before you had these slides copied for \$70.

For what ever its worth we did succeed in recording all the discussions and they are a good resource for anyone doing research on the issues surrounding this show, and as such will be made available to anyone wanting to hear them. I also still have black and whites from many of the artists and they are used as a resource for our curatorial staff as well as outside curators who often inquire here for information about minority artists.

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This incident does not in any way reflect the Institute's attitude towards marginal groups, it does however reflect a fiscal crunch, combined with a lack of curatorial professionalism due to the departure of Tom Finkelpearl, our Deputy Director, and our Program Director during the time of your exhibition. I sincerely apologize for the inadequate documentation, but I felt I had to describe the situation from my own perspective. If you want to talk to me further about this call any time.



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


