CONTINUED FROM PAGE 19 political climate where art's relevancy to a broad public audience is more than ever in question. But if there are no hard answers, there's plenty of evidence of P.S. I's continued vitality. Blue-chip artists are roaming the hallways. Younger contemporaries are nervously at work. Art, it seems, is everywhere: from the Robert Ryman paintings hanging in a skylit former coal bin, to the vast gallery where Jackie Winsor's sculp-tures lie scattered like the abandoned geom-

etry of a race of giants, to the old Russian shed Ilya Kabakov has installed outdoors. And Heiss's energy is as palpable as the objects that surround her.

Alternative spaces for art have a long and illustri-ous history. From 19thcentury Parisian salons des refusés to the 1913 Armory Show in New York, dissi-dent art has been found in dissident places. But by the mid 70s, when Heiss founded P.S. 1, alternative spaces were proliferating— symptoms, perhaps, of a broader social restles Heiss, the daughter of Midwestern schoolteachers, ran several New York alternative art spaces simultaneously in the early '70s. (The

ously in the early 70s. (The SOULCONNESS COLOCKOWER IS the only one still in existence.) Around 1975, she says, she began to feel the limitations of working on short-term projects and in provisional places. P.S. 1 opened the following year in an abangloned Gothic Revival school building that Heiss, leased from the city. This place is about trying to deal with problems that are perhaps less yeary and glamorous, but have profound effects on the productive lives of artists and viewers. on the productive lives of artists and viewers, she says. 'It's about long term thrills.'

During the 80s, nonpront alternative arts spaces survived on state support in the margins of a thriving art market that increasingly monopolized artists' attention. Most nonprofits are still reeling from the effects of massive budget slashing in the '90s. P.S. 1's floors and walls were crumbling, and the building might have dosed, but the city's Department of Cultural Affairs agreed to underwrite nearly 85 per cent of the cost of its repair and renewal, which had been planned for 10 years. But the institution's operating budget remains a scant \$1.5 million. On a tour, Heiss descends to the basement, where Chinese artist Chen Zhen has created a womblike room out of crushed paper, sur-rounded by "chandeliers" made of red light-bulbs and wire baskets; within it is a huge cylinder covered with abacuses and calculators, designed to be rotated like the prayer wheels of Tibetan temples. "When I worry about money, which is every morning," Heiss says. "I come down here and turn this, and chant."

For the moment, this method appears to be working. Aided by Los Angeles-based architect Frederick Fisher's stunning renovation. Heiss has managed to project her institution into the next century with style, integrity, and verve. Working with understated means and a limited budget, Fisher has achieved monu-mental effects. He's reversed the 19th century building's formerly inconspicuous entrance to its more industrial-looking rear. There, a senes of serene and strikingly beautiful outdoor galleries leads visitors up a grand flight of stairs. Ironically, the monumental staircase links P.S. 1 visually with that obverse of alternative

phasize flexibility and multiplicity. The hallways and many rooms retain much of the original school ambience, while others were stripped and combined to create imposing exhibition galleries.

To arrive at his plan, Fisher worked intensively with artists and art professionals. The open-air galleries, with their emphasis on light and sky, were inspired by the work of artist James Turrell, whose ethereal instal-lation remains permanently displayed within. "The whole building," Fisher explains on the phone from Los Angeles, "was conceived of

as a blank canvas for the

artists' work. Fisher thinks P.S. 1 is a powerful response to current political accusations of art's "elitism." "Here you have an enormous space for contemporary art in a working-class community in Queens. And it's not just a place where art is brought down from on high to the community. It's also a place where art is made. It has a studio arts program, and a children's arts program. When, in an opening exhibition, you're able to show the work of

In a second-floor gallery, Lynne Yamamoto

was preparing a show of quietly powerful in-stallations based upon the life of her grandmother, who worked as a laundress on a sugar plantation in Hawaii. Yamamoto is an alumnus of P.S. 1's studio program; her work is representative of a strain of '90s art that weds the formal vocabulary of minimalism with organic materials to express highly charged emotional content and explore issues of memory, history, and identity. Yamamoto is also an artist of the '90s in that she holds down four teaching jobs to support her work; its relevance to a broad audience (in her case, secondary-school stu-dents) is something that's tested daily.

Downstairs, Sarah Sze was putting the fin-ishing touches on a two-part installation. She's cut into the wall to reveal electrical circuits, and in-stalled in the recess an elaborate, miniature world of plants, lights, water, digital clocks, and toothpick furniture, evoking the fragile, tenuous exis-tence of a parallel universe. Sze explained. "I'm

On the way out, you pass through a gallery where several older women, students from its former incurration as a school, are setting up tables for a reunion. Their presence is an ironic reminder that the life of spaces is forever mutating. 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





Dear Alexander and Marina.

Thanks for your fax. I only returned yesterday from a vacation and did not see it before. I hope you had good holidays and could enjoy some time off too.

We are slowly but steadily moving towards the final repair even though the procedure still seems haunted by delays outside our influence:

When I called Ron Bohez on December 12 to inquire about the shipment of the replacement elements he told me that they were not yet shipped. So they shipped them then, and they did not arrive before everybody left for the holidays.

We finally got a confirmation from an electrical engineer that there should be no problem if we change the transformer to a three phase transformer. This transformer was immediately ordered. Enclosed you find his report for your documentation and future needs.

The last step will immediately happen after Hanks return form his holidays on January 20. The replacement elements will be installed and the ladder will be hooked up to the new transformer supervised by Steve Weiss – an electrical engineer with a degree from Stanford. So the ladder will be wired back to it's original state and tested before shipped to Bern.

I would have been happier myself with a quicker progress but that's what I can report and I am grateful for your understanding.

I thought the invoices were paid before I left and will check when our accountant returns on Monday.

Die U\$ 25.000,- loan fee in meinem Fax vom 27. April waren insofern ein Mißverständnis, als dies die loan fee für alle anderen Stationen ist. Für New York (PS1) wurden, wie Sie richtig anführen und wie ich auch meinen Aufzeichnungen entnehmen kann, U\$ 20.000,- als loan fee vereinbart. Das heißt, gegenüber allen anderen Stationen wurden Sie bereits um U\$ 5.000,- bevorzugt. Darüber hinaus zahlen Sie auch keine anteiligen Rücktransportkosten und auch die Tatsache, daß der Transport nach New York teurer ist als innerhalb Europas wird in den Transportkosten nicht berücksichtigt. Ich glaube, Sie werden mir Recht geben, daß U\$ 20.000,- loan fee für eine Ausstellung, die uns bisher ATS 3,8 Mio. gekostet hat (ohne Rücktransport) nicht übertrieben ist und wir sind auch nicht bereit hier weitere Konzessionen zu machen.

Weiters bin ich etwas beunruhigt, da ich einerseits von Hans-Ulrich Obrist gehört habe, daß Sie bereits seit längerer Zeit keinen Kontakt mit ihm hatten und Sie darüber hinaus in Ihrem Fax vom 1. Mai anführen, daß Sie "noch immer keinen Sponsor für die Ausstellung gefunden" hätten. Ich ersuche Sie daher höflich mir umgehend eine definitive Zusage und einen entsprechenden Termin zu faxen. Weiters erlaube ich mir, Sie darauf hinzuweisen, daß die loan fee im Vorhinein zu bezahlen ist. (Dies dürfte für Sie kein Problem darstellen, da – wie Sie in Ihrem Fax schreiben – der betreffende Scheck von Frau Lauder bereits bei Ihnen eingelangt ist.)

Ich bin von Ihrer Vorgangsweise ein wenig Überrascht, hoffe aber, daß es sich hier lediglich um Kommunikationsschwierigkeiten handelt. Ich finde es etwas ungewöhnlich, daß wir noch immer kein offizielles Schreiben von Ihnen erhalten haben und auch Ihr Hinweis auf den nicht vorhandenen Sponsor finde ich ungewöhnlich, da wir (Sylvie Liska) ja für Sie den Sponsor für die loan fee gefunden haben! (Transport von Bordeaux) aus meinem letzten Fax.



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different positions make clear that there is no such thing as an "Asian city" but that there are manifold, heterogeneous concepts of the city.
