

This is a partial listing of art works designed for Carnival Knowledge during 1982

Ring of Fortune by Lyn Hughes, with Beverly Naidus, Anton Van Dalen, and Rachel Chernoff

Slide #1 A game about sexual stereotypes in marriage.

Participants toss dimes through a giant brass (wedding) ring that hangs in the doorway of a pastel candystripe and polkadot open frame "house" surrounded by white picket fence and astroturf lawn. The object is to land the dime on a great "bed of roses" inside of which sits an iron skillet and a black briefcase, representing the things that a man and wife give each other in marriage. Prizes include fortunes for women like, "A tall dark handsome stranger will come into your life, but don't expect much," and, for men, "If a woman gives you a hard time, you're in luck."

Feminist Fashions

Snake Goddess costume by Sabrina Jones. Hand-sewn satin with small satin snakes outlining the reproductive organs.

A sign next to the costume reads:

The Snake Goddess -- 1600 BC -- This proud mother goddess reigned supreme in ancient Crete. Snakes symbolized rebirth in the cult of female fertility. Christianity turned them into a symbol of the evil of female sexuality.

b. Offensive Front by April Ford. A bright pink-and-white football outfit with a women's symbol on the helmet. Front of costume is gaily outlined in fuschia, while the back (Defensive Back) has ladders on which small cutouts of male executive types are climbing up and down. A sign reads:

Offensive Front -- Football players only play one position at a time, but feminists must play defensive and offensive in the same game. Right-wing politicians are trying to make feminists take the blame for the "breakdown of the family." What they actually fear is the fall of the patriarchal power structure. Their fear is a sign of our progress. Therefore we must not lose yardage by getting defensive and playing their game. We must continue to be offensive, if that means fighting now for full reproductive freedom and expressing our sexuality openly no matter who it offends.

c. The Explorer by April Ford. Bright green pants with hip decorations: small fabric "worlds" hanging from the waist. A large hat with a small woman positioned on it -- the

hat is like a boat. The shoes are spike heels with the heels taken off and put on top of the toes. Small fists come out of the spike of the heel. A sign says:

Hips are back! They've been rescued from Calvin Klein, who had them hidden in a storage space in Queens. These traveler's pants help show off those beautiful large hips! There's something about having the world at your hips... and feet, what about the feet? Do high heels hurt feet? Well now you can have your heels and wear them too. Large hats are big this season. In this one, you'll go places without moving.

Abortion: A Woman's Personal Choice, video interviews by Linda Davenport

Slide #3 Documents moral decision-making by women.

This video project includes moving personal narratives by six women, most of whom have had both legal and illegal abortions. To make these difficult tapes, Linda advertised at abortion clinics, birth control clinics, and women's groups. She was able to get intimate interviews because of the personal nature of her works. She has plans to continue this project; at each Carnival, people can sign up to be interviewed.

Turn the Heat up on Congress, mailbox by Anne Pitrone

Encourages participation in the electoral process.

This wooden stove painted like a mailbox has day-glo flames under a picture of Congress, and a large pot on a burner that holds the letters the audience writes to their representatives. The idea of this "game" is to get people to sign and send as many pieces of mail as possible on reproductive rights issues.

The World's Larget Sexual Organ: The Brain by Tom Masaryk

Slide #4 Shows the connection between the body and the brain, the intellectual site of sexual expression.

The audience sits comfortably inside a large dome soft-sculpture "brain" and listens to taped interviews about sexual guilt and social mores. For the NY Carnival, Tom concentrated on interviewing the elderly, whom he found to have a keen insight into 'kicking' sexual guilt. He worked with the Gray Panthers and in various nursing homes in the metropolitan area. The audience can volunteer for interviews, or respond by writing down their own sexual guilts, and leaving them behind forever in a "confessional box" inside the brain.

Explode-A-Myth balloon game by Sharon Jaddis

Slide #5 Educates the public with little-known facts that burst through conservative thinking.

"Put a Dart in the Heart of a Social Stereotype" by popping balloons whose numbers correspond to cliches -- closely followed by clear Carnival explanations. A sample:

Myth: Pro-Family Legislation will bring back traditional family values.

Answer: The economy is in shambles. Inflation and unemployment are on the rise. Althought the Human Life Amendment and the Family Protection Act will not solve these problems, many of its supporters want to reduce unemployment by removing women from the work force, propelling women back to the kitchen. Only l of 15 Americans live in this "traditional" family of working husband, non-working housewife/mother, non-working children. But what about the rest of use who can't afford to live this way, and those of us who choose to live in other ways?

Jerry Falwell Kissing Booth by Linda Davenport & Anne Pitrone

Slide #6 Connecting the Moral Majority President with book-banning and other Hitler-like tactics.

A life-size photo shows Jerry smiling with a Hitler mustache. He stands in a bright red closet. Flames rise to consume such women's health books as Our Bodies Our Selves, Immaculate Deception, etc. Participants are invited to place a large red "X" anyplace on J.F. (This booth is the beginning of a Carnival wax museum celebrating historical figures and moments in reproductive rights.

Questions and Answers by Ame Gilbert, Sarah Safford, Barbara Osborne, and Anne Greenfield

Slide #7 Explores roles played by various family members.

Two large, brightly-colored folding display panels about family life show a man, woman and child with blank notebooks for faces. The audience can fill in facial expressions, as well as conversations in the "balloon" notebooks at the side of each head. The artists are saving the drawings made at each carnival for a book about popular ideas of the family.

Sterilization by Marina Guttierez

 Demonstrates the political possibility of involuntary
 sterilization for all people.

Three life-sized wood cut-out figures represent women from various ethnic groups who have experienced forced sterilization. The figures hold out bowls which contain "chance cards" with

sterilization statistics internationally. The audience may stand in the figures' shoes, look 'through' their eyes, and imagine what it would be like to have no choice.

The Last Great Jack-Off by the Born-Again Terrorists

Slide #9 Connects Moral Majority politics with fascism and militarism, and educates about specific politicians.

A six-foot Jack-in-the-box with small boxes on three sides. Each small box has a quote from a member of the new Right. The audience tries to guess the speaker of the quoted lines before popping the jack and recognizing the puppet/politician. (boxes contain Jerry Falwell, the Pope, etc.) The fourth side has a chained-up crank. It is the Jack of War. Inside the giant box is a nuclear warhead, ready to pop out; the chain is decorated with ribbons emblazoned with names of people who died in international struggle.

Home Birth by Cindy Feldman

Connects birth with abortion rights as two aspects of reproductive freedom.

A large painting of a woman giving birth at home. Under the painting is a box, containing a book explaining the home birth movement, illustrated with photographs.

Tightrope Walker (no net) by Enrico Giordano & David Channon

Slide #16 Visualizes the threats against reproductive rights.

A life-sized brightly-painted figure of a woman (No Net Nanette) can be cranked across a tightrope over menacing figures of the "church" and of "political rape." The tightrope walker is, of course, always triumphant.

Know Your Right-to-Life Legislators by Sue Frazier

Squeeze their balls and see their state. Educates the public about specific faces in the Right-to-Life legis-lative battle.

A map of the US is flanked by eight life-size RTL legislators, dressed in blue suits with blue rubber balls. Audience is invited to squeeze their balls, causing a New Years' noisemaker to pop from the map, showing which state the particular legislator hails from.

Working Woman's Wheel of Misfortune by Cindy Dunne

Slide #13 An homage to the ERA also connects economic power with the ability to raise children.

A large wheel of fortune shows various careers like "home-making," "government," "clerical," etc. When the spinning wheel stops, a corresponding prize is picked from the bucket of facts, indicating what women can expect to earn in that particular field. Also included is information on what women can do to correct these inequities.

Ronald McHaig, Human Torpedo & Marianne the Magnificent by Greg Willard & Family

Demonstrates the relationship between Reagan's power and Moral Majority political action groups. Also familiarizes audiences with various government officials and the laws they have sponsored.

Greg's son, wearing a Reagan mask, is shot from a cannon fired by Moral Majority power. What comes out is a frozen turkey. Marianne lifts dumbbells with the names of dumbbells written upon them: Haig, Laxalt, etc. The audience suggests further names, which Marianne paints on the weights before lifting them over her head in victory.

Bazaar Conception Medecine Show, tap and rap with Sarah Safford

Slide #14-16 A guide to choices in contraception and parenting for teens and adults.

An extraordinary 20-minute tap-dancing show that explains the importance of talking about sex. It also includes a short history of contraception, with new nursery rhymes. Sarah worked with highschool and junior highschool kids in developing this piece.

Destiny, a play written and directed by Lupe Garnica (Chicano Raza Group)

Unravels the cliche of 'irresponsible' motherhood.

Children find a baby in the garbage can and start asking questions about abortion, the law, and morality. Lupe works with young kids from Loisada.

Erotic breads and cookies by Katie Dodd

Cookies of couples in various (modest) positions. Large breads of fertility goddesses.

Dear Franklin Furnace:

Since 1981, Carnival Knowledge has been working in public, attempting to gain an audience both outside and inside the art world. We have performed at street fairs in Manhattan and Brooklyn, the YWCA in a small upstate town, and on the beaches of Brooklyn and the Bronx, as well as in universities and performing spaces. Our purpose in looking for such a diverse audience has been to learn about the effectiveness of our work, particularly as a method of education.

In October 1982 we attempted to perform at SEXPO, "the world's fair of erotica." We were excited about working on reproductive rights issues with an audience mainly interested in pornography, and finding ways to show connections between sexual and reproductive freedom. Unfortunately, SEXPO was shut down the night it opened. Since then, we've decided to continue working on this project. However, we thought we should come to the art world for protecrion and support, since the issues are so inflammatory.

We chose Franklin Furnace for "coming in from the cold" because it is dedicated to social and political art, and we respect the shows we've seen there. We also wanted to have the opportunity of showing our work over several weeks' time, rather than a one or two-day event.

We hope that Franklin Furnace will accept this proposal for their 1983-4 season; and be aware that the Carnival, and therefore Franklin Furnace, may be attacked from many sectors for takingeon such a project. However, we believe that the "Second Coming" should take place, and hope that you will support this project.

PROPOSAL FOR 1983-84 SEASON

TITLE:

The Second Coming

CONTENT:

Theme An erotic and pornographic carnival pursuing forms and media of sexual expression not demeaning to women, men and children. An attempt to define a "feminist pornography."

Media Participatory sculpture, books, tableaux, games, video, performance.

PROCESS:

The carnival organizing committee solicits proposals from artists, writers and performers. The selection process involves discussion and development with the artists. (Non-exclusionary on the basis of sex)

WHY A PORN SHOW?

The Carnival Knowledge presentation of "The Second Coming" is designed to take a new look at pornography and its influence on the psyche of the American public.

Presently there are three factions making their ideas heard about sexuality: the "Moral Majority," the porn industry, and the feminist movement. Within the feminist movement there is a controversy involving "pro-sex" and "anti-porn" groups. Feminists have always been critical of the "sexual revolution," which was seen to be firmly rooted in patriarchal ideology. Althought sexual freeedom was a goal in the women's movement, this was frequently

addressed only in terms of freeing women from victimization. Sexuality itself as an issue was never fully addressed.

Valued and repressed. We either see sex as an ultimate validation, or fear it as a destructive force. Porn as a mass market packaging of sexuality has become a crucial issue, splitting the feminist movement. To make matters worse, conservative forces have attacked porn as a way of further repressing sexuality. Anti-porn feminists often find themselves unwitting comrades of the police and the "Moral Majority," while pro-sex feminist find themselves associated with the porn industry. The split has polarized, rather than illuminated the issues. Who can choose between the Pope and Playboy magazine?

This climate has given us reason to believe that a carnival about these issues would be an important step in the continued development of political theory on sexuality and porn.

Art has the radical potential to address these issues and open a dialogue in good humor because, differing from conferences and panel, it will not just talk or theorize about porn and sexuality. The carnival will invite the public to experience and analyze.

We recognize the value that pornography has had in our lives. It has given us room for pleasure, privacy, fantasy and freedom to explore sex where there might have been no other way. But we also recognize the demeaning effect porn has had on both women and men. Through the carnival, we seek to confront the distortions of pornography, and revitalize our erotic perceptions by creating our own "porn."

II. Theory and Practice

Porn isolates sex from the rest of our lives. Mothers are not sexy. Porn discourages active sexual creativity. Porn objectifies our partners. Porn is anti-female propaganda which acts to reinforce subservient roles for women. Women in power are not sexy unless they're into S & M.

We want to create:

New imagery of sexual women, including ways of looking for sexual encounters that do not affirm patriarchal society.

New imagery of sex between partners. New ways to fantasize. Pro-female pornography, integrating equal and powerful roles within society.

III. Logistics at Franklin Furnace

The front room and windows of Franklin Furnace will appear as our version of a Times Square bookstore. Items on display include: paintings, small objects, photographs, texts and books dealing with sexual imagery. Topics will include birth control, abortion, childbirth, aging, body images and gynecology, as well as sexual fantasies and autobiographical stories.

The basement, open during performance times only, is one large carnival installation complete with hawkers, strolling performers, and audience participatory games relating to work, religion, family, government, politics, love and porn. Artists and actors will collaborate so that the hawking of the pieces becomes as intentional and choregoraphed as the objects themselves.

The basement will also include an area for stage performances and a film and video screening area.

Specific ideas currently being developed are: CARNIVAL BOOTHS

1. Build your own dildo, an "erection set" modeled after the Mr. Potato game. Viewer constructs an ideal dildo.

- 2, Working Woman's Wheel of Misfortune. A spin of the wheel lands you in a sex-industry career and gives you information about your position;
- 3. Sexual Hang-Ups, a string game. A comely performer offers the player a chance to choose from a bundle of strings. An interesting toy brings you information about a sexual hang-up. A lucky pull brings you a pretty "orgasm" you can take home.


MULTI-MEDIA PRESENTATIONS

- 1. Horror House. Viewer becomes the guilty party in a journey through histories' treatment of adulteresses.
- 2. Peep Show. Revealing a woman's private preparations to make herself desirable;





All artists, both male and female, as well as political groups, and individuals may submit proposals to this carnival by following these guidelines.

- Works should be in the style of a carnival, a circus, an educational exhibit (i.e., science fairs, or corporate displays), or a women's bazaar. They should be interactive with the audience whenever possible.
- 2. Works should specifically attempt to clarify, illustrate, or educate the public about the following reproductive rights issues:

Abortion
Sterilization Abuse/Population Control
Lesbian Rights
Women's Health and History
Birth Control
Sexual Freedom
Lives of Minority Women
The Family
Menstruation/Menopause
What We Need to Raise Children

- 3. Deadline for Proposals: ASAP. All proposals will be reviewed before appearing in the carnival. Please specify whether you are working on a booth, game, side show, performance or other type of piece. Include a sketch with some idea of dimensions, and explain how the piece will work to educate people about one or more of the above issues. Send proposals to Carnival Knowledge; 513 E. 13th St., N.YC 10009.
- 4. Acceptance: All proposals will be reviewed for political as well as artistic considerations. Criteria will be clarity, politics, size, and whether it fits into the "carnival" image. No proposals will be rejected without discussion with the artist or group. It is important to us that projects be flexible to suggestions from the review group. It is not wildness that we are rejecting, just muddy political thinking.
- 5. Money, Materials, Space: We are being funded so far by private grants, as well as grants from the NY Coalition for Reproductive Rights and the Eastman Foundation. This so far is not enough to cover all materials for artists, but we do have access to a lot of materials that are available to anyone on a first come first serve basis. With our grant money we also hope to get a studio for storage and work that would also be open for your use. Flease submit a list of materials you need as part of your proposal.
- 6. Audience: We are planning to travel in low and middle income neighborhoods this year in the New York area. But our first two dates at the New School and in Binghamton will be likely to have a mostly female audience, since these are dates that are celebrating women's accomplishments. The first date is scheduled directly after the International Women's Day March, and the second will draw on the organized women's community in Binghamton. But since the purpose of this carnival is to expand the audience for reproductive rights issues and broaden the base of support, works to a general audience are very much encouraged, especially those that will draw People into issues in a positive and humorous way.

WHY APORN SHOW?

The Carnival Knowledge presentation of the "Second Coming" is designed to take a new look at pornography and sexual expression in the eighties.

We as feminists have always been critical of the "sexual revolution" which was seen to be firmly rooted in patriarchal ideology. Although sexual freedom was a goal in the women's movement, this was frequently addressed only in terms of freeing women from victimization. Sexuality itself was never fully considered.

In the eighties, sexuality remains both overvalued and repressed. We either see sex as an ultimate validation, or fear it as a destructive force. Pornography as a mass market packaging of sexuality has become a focal point, even splitting the feminist movement into "anti-porn" and "pro-sex" groups. "Anti-porn" feminists often find themselves unwitting comrades of the police and the "Moral Majority," while "pro-sex" feminists find themselves associated with the porn industry. Why should we have to choose between the Pope and Playboy?

This climate has given us reason to believe that a carnival about these issues would be an important step in the continued development of sexuality outside of institutions like the Church and the porn industry. Art has the radical potential to address these issues and open a dialogue in good humor because it invites the public to experience as well as analyze.

We recognize the value that pornography has had in our lives. It has given us room for pleasure, privacy, fantasy and freedom to explore sex where there might have been no other way. But we also recognize the demeaning effect porn has had on both women and men. Through this show we seek to confront the distortions of pornography, and revitalize our erotic perceptions by creating our own "porn."





WHY A PORN SHOW?

The Carnival Knowledge presentation of the "Second Coming" is designed to take a new look at pornography and sexual expression in the eighties.

We as feminists have always been critical of the "sexual revolution" which was seen to be firmly rooted in patriarchal ideology. Although sexual freedom was a goal in the women's movement, this was frequently addressed only in terms of freeing women from victimization. Sexuality itself was never fully considered.

In the eighties, sexuality remains both overvalued and repressed. We either see sex as an ultimate validation, or fear it as a destructive force. Pornography as a mass market packaging of sexuality has become a focal point, even splitting the feminist movement into "anti-porn" and "pro-sex" groups. "Anti-porn" feminists often find themselves unwitting comrades of the police and the "Moral Majority," while "pro-sex" feminists find themselves associated with the porn industry. Why should we have to choose between the Pope and Playboy?

This climate has given us reason to believe that a carnival about these issues would be an important step in the continued development of sexuality outside of institutions like the Church and the porn industry. Art has the radical potential to address these issues and open a dialogue in good humor because it invites the public to experience as well as analyze.

We recognize the value that pornography has had in our lives. It has given us room for pleasure, privacy, fantasy and freedom to explore sex where there might have been no other way. But we also recognize the demeaning effect porn has had on both women and men. Through this show we seek to confront the distortions of pornography, and revitalize our storic perceptions by creating our own "porn."







Part 1 On Limbic Art

In the context of art, we use our more recently evolved areas of the cerebral cortex and specialized sensory areas tp produce art that will appeal to us. We use our intuitive processes by way of our cortical development to feed our most basic drives. The seat of these drives is in the function of the oldest evolutionary areas of the brain, called the Limbic system. These drives, physiological and neurodevelopmental do not negate the spiritual, something that can be important to the artist. In fact, when the mechanics are brought into focus it becomes more amazing and gratifying to study and procede in an artistic manner. Please note that this is the process of investigation and not answer.

It is the contention of some that instinct prevails pver intellect. If taken in a neurodevelopmental fashion this is true since the eldest phylogenetic parts of the brain (Limbic system) have the keys to sustaining life and will indeed allow survival after destruction of newer portions of the cortex. For example, animal function on a limbic system since they do not have the cortical development that man has. Many of us have heard stories of someone who is brain damaged and reduced to living a "vegetable" exixtence in a coma state. The system that keeps these people alive (apart from machines) is the limbic system. I am not saying that art appeals to the animal in man. That is a fallacy. However art appeals to or stimulates pleasure, and again the seat of most basic pleasant and unpleasant aspects of survival is in man's limbic system. Through our most recently and highly developed sense, that of vision we first encounter an object. Then, in order of phylogenetic development we encounter with our other senses. Smell is the oldest of the senses and is the least (overtly) in man. It is quite obvious that few people are creating olfactory art. But the importance of this sense is evident. The perfume industry makes millions on wahat is a limbic sub cortical function, ancient though it may be. Other functions of the limbic system are visceral or autonomic on the basic emotional components of behavior.

Again, none of the above negates spirituality and intuition in the process of art. Spirituality is brought to us by the fact that we can reason by using our newer phylogenetic developments of the cerebral cortex. Can a dog or cat feel or express spirituality through itself as a person can? Do animals have gods? Do they believe in a divine Element? Can we answer? I can't make negations or assertions for the above. Biologically we are allowed to use the faculties we have to take intuition, instinct, and intellect and put them into art. The basis for gratification is in the fact that the brain of man when taken in the context of the neurodevelopmental framework can help the artist in realizing what it is that can be involved in doing art if it is to be aesthetic for others and the artist.

Progressive art should be politically effective on one level or another, but it helps if it's also visually inventive, funny, participatory, and positive. Carnival Knowledge is a collective of young artists now in its third year that runs a traveling street fair on reproductive rights, featuring booths, games, performances, and not least, a solid body of information hitting below the New Right's chastity belt. Subtitled "Bazaar Conceptions—See Men, Women and Children Fight the Moral Majority!" it aims at educating a broad public, taking on the antiabortion forces, family protection and human life groups, and doing so with higher spirits than these depressing lobbyists deserve. One of my favorite pieces is a tableau where the viewer can squeeze the rubber balls of right-wing senators causing a party popper to leap from a U.S. map on the state they represent.

Carnival Knowledge has set up at District 1199's Labor Day Street Fair, at SUNY Binghamton, the New School, and other places. Last summer a special portable show toured the local beaches with a uteroid kite and sand sculptures of victims of a Moral Majority shark. In July they took the show to the Right to Life Convention in Cherry Hill, New Jersey, and were formally cursed by conventioneers, who saw them as the devil. WHY A PORN SHOW?

The Carnival Knowledge presentation of the "Second Coming" is designed to take a new look at pornography and sexual expression in the eighties.

We as feminists have always been critical of the "sexual revolution" which was seen to be firmly rooted in patriarchal ideology. Although sexual freedom was a goal in the women's movement, this was frequently addressed only in terms of freeing women from victimization. Sexuality itself was never fully considered.

In the eighties, sexuality remains both overvalued and repressed. We either see sex as an ultimate validation, or fear it as a destructive force. Pornography as a mass market packaging of sexuality has become a focal point, even splitting the feminist movement into "anti-porn" and "pro-sex" groups. "Anti-porn" feminists often find themselves unwitting comrades of the police and the "Moral Majority." while "pro-sex" feminists find themselves associated with the porn industry. Why should we have to choose between the Pope and Playboy?

This climate has given us reason to believe that a carnival about these issues would be an important step in the continued development of sexuality outside of institutions like the Church and the porn industry. Art has the radical potential to address these issues and open a dialogue in good humor because it invites the public to experience as well as analyze.

We recognize the value that pornography has had in our lives. It has given us room for pleasure, privacy, fantasy and freedom to explore sex where there might have been no other way. But we also recognize the demeaning effect form has had on both women and men. Through this show we seek to confront the distortions of pornography, and revitalize our crotic perceptions by creating our own "porn."
