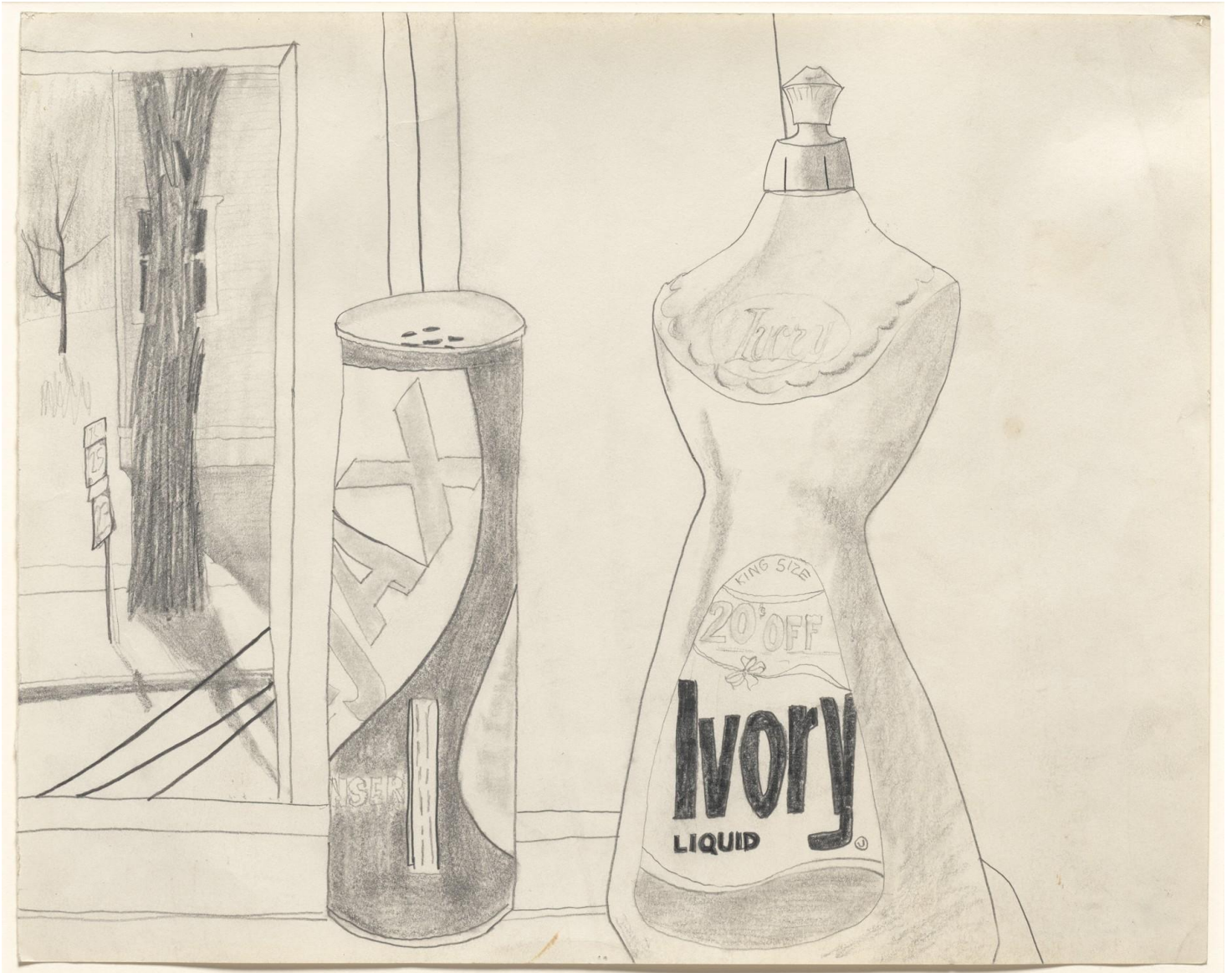

Step 1 Look closely

Questions

1. What did the artist include in this still life?
2. Why do you think the artist chose to include these objects?
3. Does using everyday household objects in a still life make them seem more important? How?
4. What can you see in the background?

Step 2 Learn more

Robert Gober drew this still life of Ivory soap and Ajax cleaner. Gober often made art that used or looked like everyday objects.

Step 3 Activity: Make a Still Life with Everyday Objects

Materials: Paper, pencil, colored pencils (optional), markers (optional)

1. Collect objects from around your home to include in this still life. Like Robert Gober did, try to focus on household objects, like cereal boxes or soap.
2. Arrange these objects into a still life. Think about how the objects are positioned and also what you want to include in the background.
3. Draw your still life.
4. (Optional) Add color using markers or colored pencils.
