HE MUSEUM OF MODERN ART

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Rens d'Harnensourt, Director of the Museum of Modern Art, arrived at 1:35 Idlewild Airport today (December 24, flight # 400, due 2:03 p.m., Mational Airlines) carrying ancient gold from Poru, valued at \$130,000, including a gold crown, gold earings and gold soulpture. They will be shown for the first time in this country in an exhibition, Ancient Art of the Andes, which opens at the Museum on January 27.

Mr. d'Harnoncourt was met by an armed guard and escorded to the Museum, 11 West 53 Street, where the precious objects were placed in the Museum vaults. The gold and tourquise jewelry and sculpture has been lent to the Museum by Don Rafael Larco Hoyle, an author and archeologist who has one of the largest collections of ancient art in the world in a Museum in Trujillo, Feru.

Among the gold pieces which Mr. d'Harmoncourt is bringing in addition to a large gold crown, are carrings inlaid with turquise and descrated with animal figures, a gold head of a feline also inlaid with turquise a gold sculpture of a human figure, a gold head ornament with stylized plumes and a sculptured human figure in the center.

Mr. d'Harmoncourt left this country on Movember 30 to complète final arrangements for borrowing gold objects, ceramics, tapestries and other pre-Columbian art for the exhibition which he is installing at the Museum.

After "Ancient Arts of the Andes" is shown in New York it will also be seen in Minneapolis and on the West Coast.
