CONTEMPORARY FILMS/McGRAW-HILL CONTRIBUTES TO MUSEUM SHOWING OF NEW NETHERLANDS FILMS

Among the new Netherlands films currently being shown at The Museum of Modern Art, one feature, <u>The Human Dutch</u>, and four short subjects are being releases in this country by Contemporary Films/McGraw-Hill.

The Human Dutch was filmed by Bert Haanstra, one of Holland's foremost directors. Haanstra employs a candid camera technique and scrutinizes the Dutch character. The picture, which was two years in the making, was a critical and box office success in Holland, and is considered the high point in the director's career.

Besides <u>The Human Dutch</u>, which will have its second showing at the Museum on Saturday, June 22, at 3 and 5:30 p.m., there will be four contemporary shorts: <u>Seven Authors in Search of a Reader</u>, a Pirandello series of associations (Thurs., June 20, at 2, 5:30 and 8 p.m.; and Sun., June 23, at 2 & 5:30 p.m.); <u>The House</u>, in which time is an element of experiment (Mon., June 17, at 2 & 5:30 p.m.); <u>Sailing</u>, directed by Hattum Hoving, an attempt to communicate the excitement and liberation of the sport (Tues., June 18, and Mon., June 24, at 2 & 5:30 p.m.); and <u>The Reality of Karel Appel</u> (Sun., June 16, and Tues., June 25, at 2 & 5:30 p.m.), a study of the Dutch artist whose oil painting of <u>Etienne Martin</u> is in The Museum of Modern Art Collection.
