VIDEO AND MYTH

January 4 - February 27, 1990

A video exhibition exploring the role of women in society is on view at The Museum of Modern Art through February 27, 1990. VIDEO AND MYTH, featuring nineteen works produced over the last seven years, explores aspects of femaleness shaped by contemporary culture, family life, history, politics, memory, and reflection. The artists represented in this exhibition examine myths created through cultural stereotypes and seek new, more personally relevant truths.

In A Spy in the House That Ruth Built, Vanalyne Green appropriates the all-male arena of professional baseball to create a visual essay about family, loss, and sexuality. In the seriocomic Womb with a View, Sherry Millner compares the bliss of an ideal pregnancy with the discomfort, confusion, and delight of her actual one. In Consider Anything Only Don't Cry, Helen DeMichiel begins with a quote from Alice in Wonderland to explore ways in which we learn and remember. (Complete program list attached.)
