THE MUSEUM OF MODERN ART OBSERVES "A DAY WITHOUT ART"

For the fourth consecutive year, The Museum of Modern Art remembers artists who are living with AIDS, as well as those who have died, in a public memorial service on Monday, November 30, 1992, the eve of A DAY WITHOUT ART, which takes place on December 1. Participants in the ceremony, held in the Museum's Garden Hall from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m., include Museum Director Richard E. Oldenburg, Museum President Agnes Gund, and Luis Cancel, Commissioner, Department of Cultural Affairs, City of New York. Baritone William Parker performs selections from the "AIDS Quilt Song Cycle, 1992," followed by Allan Gurganus, author of Oldest Living Confederate Widow Tells All, who reads his short story "Reassurance." Performance artist John Kelly closes the program singing selections from "Akin." Funding for the memorial service at the Museum has been provided by the Indian Point Foundation.

In addition to the memorial service, the Museum is recognizing A DAY WITHOUT ART with a film and video program called SPEAKING OUT: FILM AND VIDEO ABOUT AIDS, from December 3 to 6 (see attached schedule). Red ribbons demonstrating compassion for people with AIDS and their caretakers are available in the Museum's lobby during the month of December.

A DAY WITHOUT ART, the national day of mourning and call for action in response to the AIDS crisis, was designed to honor and recognize friends and colleagues in the art community who have died or are living with AIDS and to

seek greater support and understanding from the general public. The program is sponsored by Visual AIDS, an organization of arts professionals devoted to facilitating and promoting AIDS-related exhibitions and events.
