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THE CONTRIBUTIONS OF WOMEN SCREENWRITERS TO HOLLYWOOD FILMS FROM THE SILENT TO THE STUDIO ERA CELEBRATED IN A 35-FILM SERIES

The Powerful Women of Early Hollywood: Frances Marion and Her Circle January 19–February 17, 1998 The Roy and Niuta Titus Theater 1

Although Frances Marion was the most prolific of Hollywood's pioneering scenarists, writing more than two hundred films from 1916 to 1946, she was but one of several women who achieved success and recognition as a screenwriter in American cinema's first halfcentury. Beginning January 19, this group of women, which includes Anita Loos, Jeanie Macpherson, June Mathis, Bess Meredyth, and writer/director Lois Weber, and Marion herself, are celebrated in a thirty-five-film series at The Museum of Modern Art titled *The*

Powerful Women of Early Hollywood: Frances Marion and Her Circle.

As well as being good friends, the women writers in the series sometimes collaborated professionally, shaping roles for well-known actors such as Mary Pickford, Anna May Wong, Marie Dressler, ZaSu Pitts, Gloria Swanson, Greta Garbo, John and Lionel Barrymore, Rudolph Valentino, and Douglas Fairbanks, Sr.

In no way limited to writing "women's pictures," these talented screenwriters authored a broad range of comedies and adventure dramas in the silent films of the 1910s and 20s, and, adapting to the advent of talkies, continued to pen popular scripts in a variety of genres well into the 1930s.

Their work is represented in this exhibition with a selection of Marion's films including *Back Pay* (1922), *The Toll of the Sea* (1922), and *Lightnin'* (1925)—as well as

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such gems as Anita Loos's *Down to Earth* (1917), Jeanie Macpherson's *The Ten Commandments* (1923), Lois Weber's *Too Wise Wives* (1921), Bess Meredyth's *A Woman of Affairs* (1929), and *Ben-Hur* (1926) by Meredyth and June Mathis.
